

The bill entitled, An act to empower Robert Casey and Elizabeth Casey, of the city of Baltimore, to lease the free-hold and lease-hold estate of Jane B. Hammond and Henry Hammond infants of the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes; the bill entitled, An act to authorise Stephen H. Ford and Grace Ford to lease the free-hold and lease-hold estate of Ann Evans Hammond and William Hammond infants of the city of Baltimore; the bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at November session eighteen hundred and five; the bill entitled, An act to annul the marriage of John Henry Hoskyns and Anne his wife; the resolutions relative to chancellor Kilty's report of the English and British Statutes; and the resolution in favor of Joseph Wyatt were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, An act authorising Elizabeth Lockett of Frederick county, to remove certain negroes into the state of Maryland; and the bill entitled, An act for the relief of Jacob Bantz of the city of Baltimore, were severally read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act concerning the chancery court, passed by that house January 2, 1812; and the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Jan. 3, 1812

*Resolved*, That the treasurer of the Western Shore pay to John Brewer, clerk to the house of delegates, the sum of one hundred dollars; to Thomas Rogers, clerk to the senate, the sum of one hundred dollars; to John S. Skinner assistant clerk to the house of delegates, the sum of one hundred dollars; and to James G. Davis, assistant clerk to the senate, the sum of fifty dollars, as an additional compensation for their extraordinary services during the present session.
