

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Jan. 3, 1812.

*Resolved*, That the printer to the state print twenty five hundred copies of the militia law of this state, with marginal notes, stitched in form of octavo; and it shall be the duty of the executive of Maryland, to forward as soon as possible, to each major-general, ten copies; to each brigadier general, sixteen copies; to each commanding officer of a regiment, forty copies; to each commanding officer of an extra-battalion, twenty copies, to be distributed to the commissioned officers of their respective regiments, or extra battalions, as the case may be; and to each member of the legislature, two copies; and the treasurer of the Western Shore is hereby authorised to pay the expense of the same, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.
