

## VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

Pratt street in the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "By the house of delegates, June 17, 1812, read the first and second time by special order, and will not pass."

Also returns the resolution relative to public arms and accoutrements, assented to by that house June 17, 1812.

On motion, *Resolved*, That the bill entitled, An act authorising Augustin Bourgoin to hold real estate, be referred to the consideration of the next General Assembly.

The house adjourns until 4 o'clock, P. M.

## POSTMERIDIAN, 4 O'CLOCK.

The senate met.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An act to authorise the governor in certain cases to arm the militia of this state, passed by that house June 17, 1812; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, *Resolved*, That the senate proceed immediately to the election of a member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Lloyd Dorsey.

The senate accordingly proceeded to said election, and after qualifying agreeably to the constitution and form of government, the ballots being deposited in the ballot-box, on examination thereof it appeared that Mr. John Stephen was unanimously elected: *Whereupon*, it is declared in the senate, that Mr. John Stephen is unanimously elected a member of the senate.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 8 o'clock.

## THURSDAY, June 18, 1812.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, An act to authorise the governor in certain cases to arm the militia of this state, was read the second time by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An act authorising an appropriation for the penitentiary of this state, passed by that house June 18, 1812; and the following resolutions:

*Resolved*, That the executive of Maryland cause the word "Maryland" to be marked on all arms and accoutrements now in the armory, and which may hereafter be received.
