

The bill entitled, An act for the relief of John Tobin of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time and the question put shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Bayly delivers a report of the trustees of Washington Academy in Somerset county; which was read.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from John Rogers of the city of Baltimore, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Harryman, Stansbury, Blackistone, Abraham Jones and Randall.

On motion by Mr. Randall, *Ordered*, That the bill for the valuation of real and personal property in this state be made the order of the day for Thursday next.

Mr. Belt delivers a petition from William Vaughan, a soldier of the revolution, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Belt, Marriott and Wm. Hall.

The house adjourns until to morrow morning nine o'clock.

TUESDAY, November 17, 1812.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Lewis.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Belt delivers a petition from Ingram Cann, of Anne Arundel county, a revolutionary soldier, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Belt, Wm. Hall and Marriott.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from Mary Foxall, of Baltimore county, praying that a law may pass to confirm the will of her late husband Thomas Foxall; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Barney, and Sanders.

Mr. Bowles delivers a petition from Daniel Heflebower, of Washington county, praying a special act of insolvency, which was read and referred to the committee on the bill concerning insolvent debtors.

Mr. Potter delivers a petition from Shelby Jump, of Caroline county, praying that a law may pass authorising him to sell and convey certain lands therein mentioned; which was read and referred to Messrs. Potter, Young and Haghlett.

Mr. Hogg delivers a petition from sundry voters of the third election district of Cecil county, praying that the place of holding elections for said district may be changed; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hogg, Evans and Lusby.

Mr. Barney delivers a petition from Francis Holland of the city of Baltimore, praying for a supplement to An act passed in 1802, concerning a road from Baltimore to Annapolis; which was read and referred to Messrs. Barney, Randall and Marriott.

Mr. Belt delivers a petition from Thomas Elliott, of Anne Arundel county, a soldier of the revolution, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Belt, Marriott and Hall.

Mr. Barney delivers a bill entitled, An act to change and alter the names of Henry Cochran, of the city of Baltimore, to Henry Cochran Irvine, and of Charlotte Cochran, of the city of Baltimore, to Charlotte Cochran Irvine; which was read the first and second time by special order and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the benefit of John Poimer of Worcester county; the bill for the relief of Keziah Hughes of Anne Arundel county; the bill to lay out and open a road in Cecil county; the bill for the relief of Levi Carey; the bill for the relief of William Merryman late sheriff and collector of Baltimore county, and the bill for the relief of Henry Cross of the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "will pass," *Ordered* to be engrossed. Also the bill relating to the poor of Dorchester county, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments," which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And the bill for the relief of Aquila Beall of Prince George's county, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read.

On motion by Mr. Donaldson, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act for extending Greenstreet in the city of Baltimore. *Ordered*, That Messrs. Donaldson, Stansbury and Barney be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Plater delivers a bill entitled, an act supplementary to the act entitled, An act granting a loan of money to the trustees of Charlotte Hall School; and the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the report and memorial of the trustees of Charlotte Hall School, beg leave to report, that it appears to your committee from the report of said trustees, that the number of students at present in said school amounts to fifty four; of whom thirty seven are in the classical department, and seventeen in the English department. Your committee beg leave further to report, that the said seminary is supported by the tuition money and a donation from the State of eight hundred dollars, one hundred and sixty of which is annually applied to the payment of interest due upon a loan from the State, of one thousand pounds granted in the year eighteen hundred and two, that the time specified by law for refunding the said loan will expire on the first day of April eighteen hundred and thirteen, and that if the time for the payment of said loan be not extended as prayed for by the memorialists, the said seminary must fall, to the great injury of a large portion of the State, which is materially interested in the continuance and prosperity of that institution.

Your committee therefore submit to the house the propriety of passing the bill herewith reported.
