

THURSDAY, December 3, 1812.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Parnham delivers a petition from James Semenes, of Charles county, late an officer in the revolutionary war, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Parnham, Somervell and Ford.

The bill for the relief of Anne Onions, of Prince George's county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Bayly, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act authorising Matthias Dashiell, late sheriff of Somerset county, to complete his collections. *Ordered*, That Messrs. Bayly, Waller and Long be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Bayly from the committee delivers a bill entitled, An act authorising Matthias Dashiell, late sheriff of Somerset county, to complete his collections; which was read the first and second times and passed by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of John Landreth, of Somerset county, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Sanders delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford county, praying an alteration of the road from Winters' Run, near Price's mill, to the White House; which was read and referred to Messrs. Sanders, Forwood, (of William,) and Forwood, (of Jacob.)

Mr. Potts delivers a petition from Richard Butler, of Frederick county, praying that the depreciation of pay due to him as Deputy Quarter Master, may be allowed; and a petition from Barbara Tice, widow of Nicholas Tice, praying that the depreciation of pay due her said husband as Deputy Quarter Master, may be allowed to the representatives of her said husband; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Potts, Graham and Delaplaine.

Mr. Graham delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for a lot of land to enable them to turnpike the road leading from Frederick-Town to Harper's Ferry; which was read and referred to Messrs. Graham, Potts and Delaplaine.

The bill to open an alley from Holliday-street to North-street in the city of Baltimore; the bill to make public a road in Harford county, and to vacate certain roads therein mentioned; the bill entitled, An additional supplement to the act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors; the bill to authorise Joseph Gough, late sheriff of Saint Mary's county, to complete his collections; the bill for the relief of Cornelius Ennis, John Hancock and Charity Tarr of Worcester county; the bill for the relief of William Priestly of the city of Annapolis; the bill to confirm an old road in Worcester county; the bill supplementary to the act to confirm a road in Harford and Baltimore counties; the bill to correct a mistake in a deed therein mentioned; the bill for the relief of Thomas Edmondson, of Dorchester county; and the bill to change the name of Theodore Gunby, of Somerset county, to that of Theodore Gunby Dashiell, were sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of John and Rebecca Candler, administrators of William Candler, late sheriff of Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The house proceeded to the election of a director in the Bank of Baltimore, the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, the gentlemen named to strike retired, and after some returned and reported that Samuel Fernandis was elected:—Whereupon,

*Resolved*. That Samuel Fernandis be, and he is hereby declared to be a director in the Bank of Baltimore, on behalf of the State for the ensuing year.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the relief of William Priestly of the city of Annapolis and the bill to authorise Ezra Mantz, late sheriff of Frederick county, to complete his collections severally endorsed, "will pass." *Ordered*, to be engrossed.

Mr. Wilson delivers a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Peter G. Clarke of the city of Baltimore; which was read.

The bill to change the name of Creswell's Ferry in Cecil county, was read the second time passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Long delivers a petition from Henry Harris, a drummer in the third Maryland Regiment, during the revolutionary war, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Long, Somervell and A. E. Jones.

Mr. Graham delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick and Washington counties, praying a road from M'Shane's or Taylor's Ferry in Washington county, and from M'Pherson's Brien's Iron Works and mills to the turnpike road leading to Baltimore; which was read and referred to Messrs. Graham, William B. Williams and Delaplaine.

The bill to lay out and make public a road in Somerset county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Barney from the committee delivers a bill entitled, An act for the relief of William Smith and others of the city of Baltimore; and Mr. F. M. Hall a bill for the relief of Dennis M. Burgess of Prince George's county; which were read.

On motion by Mr. Parnham the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate.
