

The bill being read, the question was put, shall this bill pass with the proposed amendment?

*Amendment proposed.*

At the end of the bill add " And be it enacted, that the appointment of a trustee or trustees under said insolvent laws shall operate as an assignment of all the insolvent's property, so as to vest the title to the same in such trustee or trustees, without the necessity of such insolvent executing a deed there of: Provided that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to extend to applications now pending for the benefit of said insolvent laws."

Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act for the valuation of real and personal property in the several counties of this state, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to purchase a lot of ground in Coxe's town, in Baltimore county, & to erect a building thereon to be used as a school house and meeting house; a bill entitled, an act for opening & extending Low street, in the eastern precincts of Baltimore; a bill entitled, a further additional supplement to the act entitled, an act for building a new gaol in Baltimore county; a bill entitled, a further additional supplement to an act entitled, an act to direct descents, severally passed by that house Dec. 10th, 1812; a bill entitled, an act for opening and extending Aisquith street, in the eastern precincts of Baltimore; a bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Tabitha Harrison and Leah Tarr of Worcester county; a bill entitled, an act to lay out a road from Robert Wilson's tavern on the old York road; a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to lay out and open a road from the town of Westminster, in Frederick county, to the city of Washington and George town, passed at November session eighteen hundred and three; a bill entitled, an act vesting the property therein mentioned in certain trustees, for the use and benefit of the Society of Friends or people called Quakers, constituting the monthly meeting of Baltimore for the eastern district of the city of Baltimore, severally passed by that house Dec. 11, 1812; and the following resolutions:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Dec. 11, 1812.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby authorised and required to pay to James Hewitt of Somerset county, late a soldier in the revolutionary war, or to his order, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a private soldier, annually during his life.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the Western Shore pay to John Thomas Holland of Harford county, or to his order, during his life, in quarterly payments, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a private, as a further remuneration for those services rendered his country during the revolutionary war.

On motion leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks therein mentioned, and for other purposes.

Ordered, That Mr. Bruce, Mr. Tabbs and Mr. N. Williams be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

A petition from Henry Schroeder and others, praying a supplement to the act for extending and uniting Holliday street in the city of Baltimore, was preferred, read and referred to Mr. N. Williams, Mr. L. Hollingsworth and Mr. Lloyd to consider and report thereon.

On motion, the question was put, will the senate agree to the following message?

BY THE SENATE, Dec. 11, 1812.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

We have rejected your bill entitled, an act for the encouragement of learning and erecting schools in the several counties within this state, for the renewal of the charters of the several banks therein mentioned, and for other purposes. We consider ourselves precluded by the provisions of the constitution, from making any amendments in the usual form to this bill, in consequence of some of its provisions which give it the character of a money bill, and we regret that your house should have blended (inadvertently we presume) such matter with it. Considering the bill of great importance as it regards the establishment of a system of education, we are anxious to pass it, and if you will strike out the two last sections of the bill and return it to us, it will receive our hearty concurrence.
