

The bill entitled, an act to extend Forrest and Goodman streets, southerly from the city of Baltimore and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed with the proposed amendments, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

*Amendments proposed.*

1st. Strike out from the word "thence," in the 17th line of the 1st page, to the word "its," in the 18th line of the same page, and insert "in a straight line, continuing the road."

2nd. After the word "first," in the last line of the 3rd page, insert "tendered."

3rd. Strike out the word "twenty," in the 4th line of the 4th page, and insert "forty."

4th. Strike out the word "sheriff," in the 3rd line of the 5th page, and insert "levy court."

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Cambridge Academy; a bill entitled, an act annulling the marriage of Vincent P.
