

pending, and it shall and may be necessary to make such executor or administrator a party to such suit or action, it shall and may be lawful for the clerk of the county court of the county in which such suit or action shall be depending, to issue a summons directed to the sheriff of the county in which the executor or administrator of the deceased defendant may reside, returnable to the county court from which the same issued, and the sheriff of the county to whom any such summons shall be directed and delivered, shall serve the same, and make return thereof to the court from which it issued, and the same proceedings shall and may be thereon had, as is provided by the first section of the act passed in seventeen hundred and eighty five, chapter eighty."

The senate adjourns until to morrow morning 9 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, December 23, 1812.

THE Senate met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, a further additional supplement to the act entitled, an act to provide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and for the administration of justice therein, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The report of the committee to whom were referred the resolutions in favor of the officers and soldiers during the revolutionary war, was read the second time, and not concurred in.

The clerk of the council delivers a communication from the executive, covering an order passed by the court of appeals on the Eastern Shore in 1811, relative to certain repairs. Which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, a further additional supplement to the act entitled, an act to regulate the inspection of tobacco; the bill entitled, an act to authorise the levy court of Washington county, to levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned; the bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the opening of Bridge street in the Eastern precincts of the city of Baltimore; the bill entitled, an act annulling the marriage of Robert Offley, and Sarah, his wife, of Queen Ann's county; the bill entitled, an act to make public a road from Hancock, in Washington county, to Cumberland, in Allegany county, and for other purposes, and the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of Joshua Fleming, late of Worcester county, deceased, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favor of the trustees of Charlotte Hall school, in St. Mary's county, was read the second time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.
