BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Dec. 22, 1812.

Whereas, an act of congress of the 10th of April, eighteen hundred and twelve, authorised the president of the United States to call into service a detachment of one hundred thousand militia, in on der to repel invasion, enforce the laws and suppress insurrection: And whereas, the secretary of war made a requisition under the said act, on the late governor of this state, on the 31st day of July, 1812 of one company of artillery, and of as many companies of infantry, as will make an aggregate force of three hundred and fifty militia, to defend the town and harbor of Annapolis, which said call appear to this general assembly to have been unaccompanied with either of the exigencies by the constitution or the law : And whereas, the wise and patriotic framers of our constitution, having for their object the freedom, happiness, and independence of their country, thought it necessary to preserve this go vernment in its republican form, and secure the blessings of liberty to their posterity, to constitute protecting barriers against an improper and ambisious use of the military powers: And whereas, of fensive wars, national aggrandizement by accession of territory, or schemes of foreign conquest, and repugnant to the principles of our free institutions: Therefore, Resolved, That it was never contem plated by the constitution and the law, that when they trusted to the president of the United State the power of calling out the militia in certain emergencies, that he should by perverted and strained interpretations, at his discretion use that power in the absence of those emergencies; and that the calling out of the militia as aforesaid, without the existence of either of the emergencies, recognized by the constitution or the law, is an open and dangerous assumption of power, alike inconsistent with the rights of the state, and the convenience of our immediate constituents.

Resolved, that the power delegated by the constitution to the general government, to raise and support armies, as well from the nature and form of the government, as from the preamble to the constitution, was intended for the defence and protection of our territory, and that the invasion of a fereign territory by armies raised and supported by the general government and garrisoning our fork with the militia as a substitute for those armies, is holding them in service longer than any exigency existed, even if any existed at all, and an unwarrantable stretch of power, which must ultimately lead to a consolidation of these United States into a military government, if not timely and vigorously

checked and resisted by all lawful and constitutional means.

Besolved that if the general government, as a part of their policy, prefer the service of the militial to the employment of regular troops in garrison, or any other military operations, even in the state to which they belong, it is under the constitution bound to provide all the means necessary for their support, and that it has no power to burthen the states with any of the expences incident to such service.
