

OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Mr. Crabb from the committee delivers the following report :
The committee to whom was referred the petition of Alexander C. Hanson and Jacob Wagner, beg leave to report, that they have considered the same, and conceive the petitioners entitled to indemnity from the community which inflicted or permitted those injuries to be inflicted. They therefore submit the following resolution :

Resolved, that the governor be and he is hereby requested to appoint three capable and discreet persons, not residents of the city of Baltimore, to ascertain the damages sustained by Alexander C. Hanson and Jacob Wagner by the destruction of their property in Baltimore by a mob, in the months of June and July last, and the damages so ascertained shall be levied by the levy court of Baltimore county, on the assessable property of Baltimore city, and paid to the said Alexander C. Hanson and Jacob Wagner.

Which was read.

On motion by Mr. Barney, the question was put, that the bill entitled, an act for laying an additional tax on property within the city and precincts of Baltimore, be made the order of the day for Tuesday next. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Potts, the title of the bill passed yesterday for the relief of Elizabeth Lockett, was reconsidered and amended, by striking out the word "twelve" and inserting "eleven," and the bill sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to encourage the education of youth in Worcester county. *Ordered*, that Messrs Wilson, Quinton and Handy, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Peter A. Carnes, of St. Mary's county, endorsed, will pass, ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Davis delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Westminster, in Frederick county, praying an act of incorporation for the trustees of the Westminster General Meeting House; which was read and referred to Messrs Davis, Delaplane and Potts.

Mr. Wilson delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to encourage the education of youth in Worcester county; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers a letter from John Brewer, register of the land office for the Western Shore, praying compensation for services rendered in compliance with the act for the valuation of real and personal property, and informing the legislature that he has not been able to dispose of Chancellor Kilty's compilation of English and British Statutes, according to a resolution passed at the last session, and praying that the bond given by him to the treasurer for the performance of the said trust may be cancelled; which was read and referred to Messrs Bowles, Grahame and Young.

Mr. Davis delivers a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Westminster General Meeting House, in Frederick county; which was read the first and second time by special order and passed.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, May 22, 1813.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Quinton delivers a representation from the Grand Inquest of Worcester county, setting forth the defenceless situation of the county, and asking supplies of arms and ammunition; which was read and referred to the committee on that part of the governor's message which relates to the defence of the state.

On motion by Mr. Graham, *Ordered*, that the bill entitled, an act for the removal of the public records of the state, and of the several counties therein mentioned, and for the adjournment of several of the courts of law in this state, be made the order of the day for Tuesday next.

Mr. Bowles from the committee to whom was referred the letter of John Brewer, register of the land office, delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act for the valuation of real and personal property in the several counties of this state, passed at November session, eighteen hundred and twelve; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate.
