THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Perry delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in this state, and for other purposes, which was read.

Mr. Dosey from the committee to whom was referred the bill from the senate entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, reports the bill without amendment, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. T. N. Williams, the question was put, that the house reconsider the resolution relating to the public arm distributed in Washington, Allegany, Montgomery and Frederick counties. Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, that the house assent to the said resolution? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Potter, the bill from the senate entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, was read the second time by special order, and the question put, shall the said bill pass?

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to repeal all such parts of the sixth section of the act entitled, an act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, passed at November session, in the year eighteen hundred and eleven, as authorises and empowers a commanding officer of a regiment, battalion or extra battalion to order out the militia in cases of invasion or threatened invasion, and for other purposes, endorsed, will not pass; the resolution in favor of Obed Summers, endorsed, dissented from; and a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Gerard Topken, an insolvent debtor of the city of Baltimore, passed by the senate, May 28th; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.
