So it was resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey the following resolution was added :

Resolved, that the Governor of Maryland be requested to transmit to our senators and representatives in the Congress of the United States, copies of the preceding resolutions.

On motion by Mr. Young, Ordered, that the governor and council be directed to have printed, two thousand copies of the following acts, to wit : an act to provide for the settlement of claims arising from the past or future employment of the militia of this state ; an act to provide for the payment of the militia which have been called into actual service, and the necessary expences incurred by reason thereof ; and an act to provide for the detaching the militia of this state, passed at the present session ; also an act entitled, an additional supplement to a supplement to an act entitled, an act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state passed at the last session of the general assembly, with marginal notes, and stitched in form of octavo : And it shall be the duty of the executive of Maryland to forward as soon as possible to each member of the general assembly one copy, and the remainder to distribute amongst the officers of the different divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions and extra battalions of this state in such manner and in such proportions as to them shall seem proper.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 8 o'clock.

SUNDAY, May 30, 1813.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. — The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, an act authorising the several banks in the state to loan money to the state of Maryland ; the resolution relative to petitions for acts of a private nature, and the resolutions relative to the policy of the war and the conduct of the enemy, were sent to the senate.

The resolution from the senate relative to the removal of the public records, was read the second time and the question put, that the house assent to the same. Determined in the negative, and the resolution returned to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill, entitled, an act authorising the levy court of Montgomery county to appoint a constable in and for the town of Brookville, in said county, endorsed will pass. Ordered to be engrossed. The resolution for the payment of the militia accountants ; and the resolution in favor of the Rev. Joseph Wyatt, severally endorsed assented to. And the following messages :

BY THE SENATE, May 30, 1813.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message requesting a reconsideration of the bill entitled, an act for the removal of the public records of the state and of the several counties therein mentioned and for the adjournment of several of the courts of law in this state. The senate having passed a resolution on that subject which they deem adequate to the objects thereof until the next meeting of the legislature, we have therefore declined a reconsideration of the bill, and hope you will agree to pass the resolution sent from this house.

Also the resolutions relative to the expences incurred in consequence of the operations of the enemy, endorsed, assented to with the proposed amendments ; which were read, and the question was then put, that the house assent to the first amendment, to wit : " Strike out the first resolution." Determined in the negative.

The engrossed bills No. 10, 11, 15, 16, 17, 18, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey the following resolution was read :

Whereas, it is highly important that the accountants of militia claims should be men of intelligence, firmness and good accountants, and that by a selection of such characters large sums might be saved to the state, and as the sum of four hundred dollars severally allowed to them would be inadequate to procure men of such characters ; Therefore

Resolved, that in addition to the sum of four hundred dollars now allowed them, the further sum of dollars yearly, be severally allowed to them out of any unappropriated money in the treasury of the Western Shore.
