WEDNESDAY, December 29, 1813.

THE house met.—The proceedings of Thursday, Monday and Tuesday were read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act for the relief of William Downey, of Frederick county; and the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the children of Arthur Hughes, late of Dorchester county, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed; the bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of John Carman, his wife, and their three children, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment," which amendment was read, assented to and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Warner delivers a memorial from Hezekiah Clagett, counter to the petition of Levi Pearce and others, praying the extension of Franklin street in the city of Baltimore; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Williams delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Worcester county, praying the opening of a public road; which was read and referred to Messrs. Williams, Quinton and Handy.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from the trustees of Saint Peter's Free School, in the city of Baltimore, praying further pecuniary aid from the state; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Lecompte and Mason.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from the members of the Beneficial Society of the city of Baltimore, praying an act of incorporation; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Warner and Barney. Also a petition from John Simpson, of the city of Baltimore, on the subject of the extension of Aisquith street; which was read and referred to the committee to whom were referred other petitions on the same subject.

Mr. Wilson delivers a petition from Mary Jackson, of Worcester county, praying that the levy court may be authorised to levy a sum of money for her support; which was read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, Williams and Handy. Also a petition from a number of inhabitants of Worcester county, praying a public road and landing; which was read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, Quinton and Handy.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from Walter Muschett, and a petition from Alexander Mitchell, of the city of Baltimore, praying special acts of insolvency; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Barney and Randall.

Mr. Lecompte delivers a petition from Elizabeth Smith, wife of Edward Smith of Dorchester county, praying that she may be authorised to receive and hold certain property notwithstanding her coverture; which was read and referred to Messrs. Lecompte, Griffith and Potter.

Mr. Lecompte delivers a petition from John Williams, of Dorchester county, praying that his title to certain property may be confirmed; which was read and referred to Messrs. Lecompte, Griffith and Stewart.

Mr. Mason delivers a petition from Henry Swetzzer sheriff, and Matthias Shaaffner late sheriff of Washington county, praying that a law may pass making an allowance to sheriffs for the performance of certain services, for which at present they receive no compensation; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Mason, Kershner and Gabby.

Mr. Barney delivers a petition from Caleb Boyle, of Baltimore county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Barney, Donaldson and Warner.

Mr. Mason delivers a petition from Matthias Shaaffner, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, praying that he may be authorised to complete his collections; which was read and referred to Messrs. Mason, Tilghman and Gabby.

Mr. Cottman delivers a petition from William Miles, of Somerset county, praying that a law may pass authorising the sale of certain lands belonging to the infant children of his deceased brother Henry Miles; which was read and referred to Messrs. Cottman, Bayly and Waller.

Mr. Waller delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Somerset county, praying the establishment of a bank in the town of Salisbury; which was read and referred to Messrs. Waller, Bayly and Cottman.

The speaker laid before the house a report of the clerk of Charles county court, relative to the attendance of the judges; which was read and referred to the Committee of Grievances and Courts of Justice.
