The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to authorise the corporation of the city of Annapolis to repair certain wharves; the bill authorising John Ireland, late sheriff of Calvert county, to complete his collections; the bill for the relief of Rebecca Lee, and her children; the bill for the relief of Valinda Wonne Conaway; and the bill for the relief of Richard Thompson; severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the benefit of Jacob Medtart, of Frederick county; & the bill entitled, an act to give validity & operation to a deed therein mentioned, severally endorsed "will not pass." And the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Richard Newman, of Kent county, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read.

The house adjourns until to morrow morning 9 o'clock.

TUESDAY, January 11, 1814.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Francis M. Hall, delivers a memorial from the president and directors of the Baltimore and Columbia Turnpike, counter to the memorial of Gerard Snowden, and others; which was read and referred to the committee on the petition to which it is counter.

On motion by Mr. Kilgour, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act to revive and continue an act entitled, an act supplemental to an act entitled, an act to empower Rebecca Candler and John Candler, administrators of William Candler, late sheriff and collector of Montgomery county, to collect fees and taxes placed in his hands in his life time. Ordered, That Messrs. Kilgour, Crabb and Jones be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from the levy court of Baltimore county praying that they may be authorised to levy an additional sum of money to complete the wall around the jail of Baltimore county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Randall and Warner.

Mr. Kilgour delivers a petition from Samuel West, of Montgomery county, praying that he may be authorised to sell certain lands, which he holds in common with certain infants; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kilgour, Jones and Crabb.

Mr. Maulsby delivers a petition from Mordecai Amos, of Harford county, praying a special act of insolvency; and a petition from Thomas Archer, and others counter thereto; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Maulsby, Forwood, (of Wm.) and Forwood, (of Jb.)

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from Thomas M'Kean, and Joseph B. M'Kean, of Pennsylvania, praying that they may be authorised to sell certain lands belonging to the infant children of Andrew Buchanan; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, Barney and Tilghman.

Mr. Kilgour delivers a petition from Catharine Holland, of Montgomery county, praying that she may be authorised to sell certain real property belonging to her infant children; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kilgour, Jones and Crabb.

Mr. Mason delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying a road; which was read and referred to Messrs. Mason, Kershner and Gabby.

Mr. Spencer delivers a petition from the trustees of the poor of Queen Ann's county, praying that they may be authorised to increase their number of out pensioners; which was read and referred to Messrs. Jervis Spencer, Wright and Burgess.

Mr. Kershner delivers a petition from Daniel Heffebower, of Washington county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kershner, Mason and Gabby.

Mr. Sellman, delivers a petition from John S. Belt, of Anne-Arundel county, formerly an officer in the revolutionary war, praying further compensation for his services; which was read and referred to the standing committee on similar petitions.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act authorising a partition of the lands therein mentioned. Ordered, That Messrs. Wilson, John H. Thomas and Handy be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Hands delivers a bill entitled, an act to alter and change the place of holding the elections in the first election district in Kent county; which was read.

The amendments proposed by the senate to the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of John Kimes, late of Allegany county; and the amendments proposed to the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Patapsco Insurance Company, were severally read the second time, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed.

The report on the petition of sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying the establishment of a new bank in the said city, was read the second time, and the question put, that the house concur in the same? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:
