WEDNESDAY, January 12, 1814.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Lusby from the committee delivers the following report :

The committee to whom was referred the petition of John and James Allen, of Cecil county, praying some immediate relief to their wants occasioned by the conflagrations perpetrated by the British at Frederick-Town in the spring of 1813, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under consideration, and find the facts therein stated to be true. While your committee regret that the exhausted state of our revenue, and the pressing calls which are made for defence against the enemy, will not permit the state to indulge in the liberality which the character of the state for humanity and munificence would require, they cannot but express their belief, that some legislative relief should be granted to your petitioners; they therefore submit the following resolution :

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be, and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay to the aforesaid John and James Allen, or to their order, the sum of _____ dollars, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.
