

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act explanatory and supplemental to an act entitled, an act respecting the bringing of slaves from the District of Columbia into this state, endorsed "amendments reconsidered and receded from." Ordered to be engrossed. The report on the petition of Araminta Sipple, was read the second time and concurred in. The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of Wm. Ringgold, of Kent county, was read the second time and passed.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act authorising appropriations for the penitentiary of this state, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate certain persons in every christian church congregation in this state, was read the second time by special order, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The bill entitled, an act authorising Matthias Shaaffner, late sheriff of Washington county, to complete his collections, was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from the lutheran and presbyterian congregations of Baltimore and Frederick counties, composing the congregation of the Jerusalem church, praying an act of incorporation; which was read and referred to Messrs. Randall, Harryman and J. H. Thomas.

Mr. Kilgour delivers a bill entitled, an additional supplement to an act entitled, an act to empower Rebecca Candler and John Candler, administrators of Wm. Candler, late sheriff and collector of Montgomery county, to collect fees and county taxes put into his hands for collection during his life time; which was read.

Mr. John H. Thomas delivers a bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Frederick county; which was read.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Wm. Patterson, Wm. Smith, Wm. Cooke, and others; which was read.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

Ringgold, of Kent county; the bill to annul the marriage of Everett Wroe and Mary Wroe; the bill for the relief of Edwin Kimmey; and the resolution in favor of James Buther, James Hall and others, were sent to the senate.
