The clerk of the senate delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate a company for making an artificial road by the best and nearest route from the Philadelphia and Lancaster turnpike road, through the village of Strasburg in Lancaster county, to the Susquehanna bridge at McCalls ferry, and from thence to the city of Baltimore; which was read the first and second time by special order, and the question put, shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The engrossed bills No. 154, 159, 161 and 162 were sent to the senate.

The bill to pay the civil list and other expences of civil government, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Barney the question was put, that the house assent to the following resolution:

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to pay the civil list and other expences of civil government, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. Also the journal of accounts endorsed, "read and assented to;" and the bill entitled, an act for the payment of the journal of accounts, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Howard, the following resolutions were read, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Resolved, That the governor and council cause to be published in some newspaper in each county of this state, where there may be a newspaper, an act entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for regulating the mode of staying executions and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned and for other purposes, passed at May session 1813, and an act entitled, a further additional supplement to the act entitled, an act for regulating the mode of staying executions and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and for other purposes; and also the act entitled, an act to continue in force the acts of Assembly which would expire with the present session, passed at this session.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to the order of the governor and council such sum of money as may be expended in carrying the provisions of the aforesaid resolution into effect, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

On motion by Mr. J. H. Thomas, *Ordered*, That when this house adjourns, it stand adjourned until the first Monday in October next.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to confirm an act entitled, an act to alter and repeal such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state as relate to the division of Allegany county into election districts; the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Baltimore Beneficial Society; and the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Philip German, Junr. of the city of Baltimore, severally endorsed, "will not pass." BY THE SENATE, January 31, 1814.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received sundry resolutions in favor of the petitions of revolutionary soldiers from your honorable body, praying further remuneration for services rendered during the war waged by the United States against Great Britain, for the establishment of American independence. We are
