

Elk River in Cecil county, in the state of Maryland, to the Delaware line, in a direction towards the town of New Castle, except such part thereof as is altered and changed by this act; and a bill entitled, an act to authorise the sale of the right of cutting a mill race through the land of Richard Simper's a minor, in Cecil county, severally passed by that house Jan. 18, 1814; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. L. Hollingsworth from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to the bridge at McCall's ferry and through Strasburg to the Lancaster and Philadelphia road; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The resolution in favor of the governor and council and their officers, was read the second time and assented to.

The bill entitled, an act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for certain purposes therein mentioned; and the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Elizabeth Smith of Dorchester county, were severally read the second time by special order, and will not pass.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Thomas Batt of Anne-Arundel county, was read the second time by special order, and will pass with the proposed amendments.

*Amendments proposed*

1st. Strike out the preamble.

2nd. Strike out the words "the said" in the 14th line of the bill.

The senate proceeded to the election of bank directors on the part of the state, the ballot box being prepared the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned and reported, that Richard K. Heath had forty-three votes, Washington Hall forty-two votes, John E. Howard twenty-nine votes, and Charles Carroll of Carrollton twenty-eight votes, as directors for the Union Bank of Maryland; that Christopher Raborg Junr. had forty-eight votes, George Taylor forty-two votes, Cornelius Comegys twenty-eight votes, and Samuel Sterett twenty-four votes as directors for the Mechanic's Bank of Baltimore; that Edward Harris had forty-one votes, James Hindman twenty-nine votes, and James Henderson one vote as director for the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore; that Thomas H. Bowie had forty-two votes, Daniel Murray forty-two votes, Thomas Harris, Junr. thirty-one votes and Brice J. Worthington thirty-one votes as directors for the Farmers' Bank of Maryland at Annapolis; that David Kerr Junr. had sixty-two votes, Tench Tilghman forty-two votes, Robert L. Nichols twenty-three votes, and Robert H. Goldsborough one vote as directors for the Branch Bank at Easton; that Joseph McIlhenny had forty-two votes, John Harvy forty-two votes, Thomas B. Hall thirty-two votes and Thomas Buchanan twenty-eight votes as directors for the Hager's Town Bank; and that John Frey had forty-two votes, and John Stump of Cecil, thirty-one votes as director for the Elkton Bank of Maryland.

*Whereupon,* It is declared in the senate, that Richard K. Heath and Washington Hall, for the Union Bank of Maryland; Christopher Raborg Junr. and George Taylor for the Mechanic's Bank of Baltimore; Edward Harris for the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore; Thomas H. Bowie and Daniel Murray for the Farmers' Bank of Maryland at Annapolis; David Kerr Junr. and Tench Tilghman for the Branch Bank at Easton; Joseph McIlhenny and John Harvy for the Hager's Town Bank; and John Frey for the Elkton Bank of Maryland; having had a majority of votes, are elected directors on the part of the state, for and during the term prescribed by law.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Brown leave given to bring in a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act for the relief of the poor of Queen Ann's county. Ordered, That Messrs. Brown, Fenwick and Hebb be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the speedy recovery of small debts out of court and to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned, passed by that house Jan. 18, 1814; a bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower the levy court of Caroline county to assess and levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned.
