

On motion by Mr. Barney, ordered, that the bill supplementary to the act to prohibit the collection of certain wharriages in the city of Baltimore, be made the order of the day for Wednesday next.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Frederick county, and the bill entitled, an act authorising the sale of the real property of which Gabriel P. Van Horn died possessed, severally endorsed, "will not pass." The bill entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Baltimore county, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

Also a bill entitled, an act to straighten certain roads near the Little Falls of Gunpowder, and a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Bellona Gunpowder Company of Maryland, severally passed by the senate, Jan 6. Which were read.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Philip German, Junr. endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed—and the following message:

Mr. Kell, from the committee on the petition of John Murray and Josias Stevenson, reports the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the treasurer of the western shore be, and he is hereby authorised and directed to release Josias Stevenson and John Murray, the securities of Thomas Bailey, late a sheriff and collector of Baltimore county, from the payment of interest on the sums due from said Bailey to this state; Provided, they shall fully pay the principal of the debts so due, within sixty days after the passing of this resolution. Which was read.

The bill entitled, an act to dissolve the marriage of Marcella Owings Welsh and Samuel Welsh, Junr. of Anne Arundel county, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. John H. Thomas, the question was put, that the farther consideration thereof, be referred to the next general assembly. Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Potter delivers a bill entitled, an act to provide for the safety of the public records and for other purpose. Which was read.

Mr. Lecompte delivers a petition from Elizabeth Gilliss, of Dorchester county, praying a divorce. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Lecompte, Griffith and Long.

Mr. Stevens delivers a petition from James Hopkins, of Queen Ann's county, praying that an act may pass to secure his title to certain lands. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Stevens, Hambleton and Burgess.

Mr. Lecompte, from the committee delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Richard Waters, of Baltimore city, an officer in the revolutionary war, beg leave to report that they have had the same under consideration, and believe the facts therein stated to be true, and do therefore recommend the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby directed to pay to Richard Waters, late a captain in the Maryland line, or to his order, annually in quarterly payments, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a captain, as a further remuneration for the services rendered his country during the revolutionary war.

Which was read.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill, entitled, an act to incorporate a company for the improvement of the navigation of the river Susquehannah; which was read and ordered to be printed.

On motion by Mr. Hood, ordered, that the house proceed forthwith to elect by ballot, a director in the Bank of Baltimore, on the part of this state.

The house accordingly proceeded to the election, and the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, the gentlemen named to strike retired, and after some time returned and reported, that Samuel Farnandis was elected. Whereupon,

*Resolved*, That Samuel Farnandis be, and he is hereby declared to be, a director on the part of this state in the Bank of Baltimore, for the ensuing year.

Mr. Burgess delivers a bill entitled, an act authorising John Duhamel, collector of the taxes for Queen Ann's county, to complete his collection. Which was read.

Mr. Gabby delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying a division of the third election district of said county. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Gabby, Mason, Schnebly, Tilghman and Dorsey.

Mr. Hilleary delivers a bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of John Hesselins, late of Alleghany county, deceased. Which was read the first and second time by special order, and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill entitled, an act to vest certain powers in the levy court of Worcester county, endorsed, "will not pass." The bill entitled, an act to change a part of the public road leading from Blackwater river to the head of Hungar river, in Dorchester county, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre de Grace, and the bill, entitled, an act for the benefit of the widow and heirs of William Holland, of Montgomery county, severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read. Also a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the benefit of James Gouty, Mary Gouty, Lucretia Gouty, and John Stevens Gouty, orphan children of Zachariah Gouty, late of Caroline county, deceased, passed by the senate, January 7. Which was read.
