So it was resolved in the affirmative.

The bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Kell delivers a memorial from the committee of vigilance and safety of Baltimore, praying that a law may pass to authorise the corporation of Baltimore to impose a tax for the defence of the city. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Kell, Mason, Bayly, Neale and Lecompte.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate :

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, January 19, 1815.

*Gentlemen of the senate,*

We again send you the bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a bank to be called by the name of the Farmers Bank of Somerset and Worcester, which a few days past was rejected by your body. On further consideration of this subject we still think the bill ought to pass. If, in its effects it shall not be very salutary, it certainly cannot produce any mischief. It will not increase the bank capital of the state, it is only placing a portion of it in a way to suit the convenience and advance the interests of upwards of one third of the inhabitants of the counties of Somerset and Worcester. If the present stockholders are willing to dispose of a part of their capital for the purpose of letting a considerable portion of their fellow citizens participate in its accommodation in a greater degree, without affecting in any way we can perceive the public interests, we hope that the senate will not prevent it and that on reconsideration they will pass the bill.

The bill entitled, an act to open a road in Worcester county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, Ordered, that the printer employed for that purpose, be directed to finish without delay, the printing of the bill entitled, an act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state; and to furnish this house forthwith with such parts thereof as are already printed.

The bill from the senate entitled, an act for the relief of William French, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

The report on the petition of John T. Stoddert, was read the second time, concurred, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill entitled, an act to straighten and amend a road in Harford county, endorsed, "will not pass." The resolution in favor of Jacob Gibson, endorsed, "assented to." The resolution approbating the conduct of Col. Philip Reid, endorsed, "the proposed amendment unanimously assented to."
