Mr. Beall presented a petition from John Darnell, of Prince George's county, praying to be reimbursed for expenses incurred in discharge of his duties as contractor for said county, in consequence of the stores of provisions, forage, &c. which he had furnished, falling into the hands of the enemy on their march to Washington. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Beall, Van Horn and Stonestreet.

On motion by Mr. Crabb, the following order was read and adopted:

*Ordered*, that during the remainder of the session, no leave of absence shall be granted to any member of this house, unless by application in person.

The bill entitled, an act vesting in the orphans' courts in the several counties of this state, certain powers relative to real property, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Mason, the said bill was re-committed for amendment.

Mr. Blackstone from the committee delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act providing for the calling out and detaching the militia of this state, and for other purposes. Which was read.

Mr. Barney from the committee, delivers a bill entitled, an act for the aid of the Library company of Baltimore. Which was read.

Mr. Duvall presented a petition from Basil Lucas, a soldier of the revolutionary war, praying relief. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Duvall, Beall and Hood.

Mr. Taney delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Emmitsburg, praying the incorporation of the Emmitsburg Library company. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Taney, Howard and J. H. Thomas.

The bill entitled, an act to make public a road in Baltimore county, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Barney, the further consideration thereof was postponed until the first day of June next.

The bill entitled, an act to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Princess-Anne in Somerset county, was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Quinton, the further consideration thereof was referred to the first day of June next.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Thomas Murphy, of Montgomery county, was read the second time and passed.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to appoint Thomas Harris, jr. of the city of Annapolis, trustee for the sale of the real estate of John Gwinn, Esquire, late of the said city, deceased, was read the second time and passed.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Rachel Evans, of Anne Arundel county, was read the second time and passed.

The bill entitled, "an act to repeal an act of assembly therein mentioned," was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Dorsey, to amend the title thereof, so as to read—"an act to repeal the first enacting clause of an act of assembly therein mentioned," the question was put, that the house agree to the amendment as proposed? Determined in the negative. The question was then put, shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill from the senate entitled, an act to incorporate the Powhatan manufacturing company of Maryland, was read the second time and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act passed at December session, eighteen hundred and thirteen, chapter one hundred and eighteen, entitled, an act to prohibit the collection of certain wharves within the city of Baltimore. The bill entitled, an act supplementary to the act entitled, an act to prohibit the emigration of free negroes into this state.

The bill entitled, an act to authorise the sale of a lot of ground in Baltimore county, for the benefit of the children of Andrew Buchanan, deceased. The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Sarah Carman, of Anne Arundel county. The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Elizabeth Bryan and her infant children, of Anne Arundel county. And the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Singleton Warfield, of Anne Arundel county, severally endorsed, "will not pass." Also the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Baltimore hose company, endorsed, "will pass." *Ordered to*
