The bill entitled, an act to regulate the proceedings of sheriffs and constables in certain cases, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Cecil county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates returns the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Joshua Hicks, and Ephraim Buckingham, of Baltimore county, passed by that house January 5, 1815. Ordered to be engrossed.

Also returns the bill entitled, an act to provide for holding the court of appeals for the Western shore, alternately at the cities of Baltimore and Annapolis, endorsed, "by the house of delegates, January 4, 1815, read the second time and will not pass."

Also delivers a bill entitled, an act to lay out and make public a certain cross road in Frederick county. A bill entitled, an act to change a part of the public road leading from Black water river to the head of Hungar river, in Dorchester county. A bill entitled, an act authorising a partition of the lands therein mentioned. A bill entitled an act for the benefit of Patrick Hammil, of Alleghany county. A bill entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Frederick county, severally passed by that house January 4, 1815. A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Robert Armstrong, of Alleghany county. A bill entitled, an act authorising James Grayless, collector of Caroline county, to complete his collection. A bill entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Queen Ann's county. A bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower the justices of the Levy court of Caroline county, to discontinue so much of the public road as is therein mentioned. A bill entitled, an act to vest certain powers in the Levy court of Worcester county. A bill entitled, an additional supplement to the act entitled, an act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts, severally passed by that house January 5, 1815; and the following message:
