

Mr. Bowles delivers a bill entitled, an act for the relief of John Adams of Washington county. Which was read the first and second time by special order and passed.

Mr. Long delivers a petition from Isaac Gibbons, guardian of Eliza, Mary and Thomas Gibbons, praying for a sale of the real estate of Eli Gibbons, late of Somerset county, deceased. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Long, Bayly and Wilson.

Mr. Hughes delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the city Baltimore, praying that a law may pass to open Pratt and Lombard streets. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Hughes, Lecompte, E. K. Wilson, W. Steuart and Little.

On motion by Mr. Bradford the following order was read :

So it was determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill annulling the marriage of John Turner, and Ann O. Turner of Talbot county. The bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to repair a road from Paul Hawk's church to the intersection of the Baltimore road near Charles Franklin's tavern in Frederick county. The bill annulling the marriage of Michael Entley, and Mary Entley of Alleghany county, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

The bill for the benefit of the heirs of George Little, late of Harford county, deceased, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read the first and second time by special order, agreed to and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill entitled, an act to authorise the sale of the real estate therein mentioned, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read the first time. And also the bill entitled, an act to alter and repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government as preclude the senate from making any amendment to a money bill, endorsed, "passed by the senate Dec. 21, 1815" Which was read.

The bill entitled, an act authorising the Levy court of Washington county, to levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned. And the bill to authorise Walter Slicer of Alleghany county, to import and bring into this state a certain negro therein named, were severally read the second time and passed.

Mr. W. Steuart delivers a bill entitled, an act for the relief of William G. McCluer of the city of Baltimore. Also a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Benjamin C. Colhoon of the city of Baltimore. Which were severally read.

Mr. Hilleary delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Alleghany county, praying for additional election districts in said county. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Hilleary, M. Mahon and Prather.

Mr. Hughes delivers a petition from the members of the Baltimore Bar, suggesting the propriety of increasing the per diem of the judges of the orphans' court of Baltimore county. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Hughes, Steuart and Stansbury.

The bill entitled, an act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of completing St. Lucas reformed church in Frederick county. And the bill entitled, an act to appoint trustees for the sale of the property therein mentioned, being part of the real estate of the late Henry Willis, deceased, were severally read the second time and passed.

Mr. Sellman delivers a bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of Benjamin Deford, late of Anne Arundel county, deceased. And also a bill entitled, an act to authorise and permit the removal of certain slaves, from the state of Kentucky into the state of Maryland, heretofore owned by, and in the possession of Richard Ridgely, junior, late of Kentucky, deceased. Which were severally read.

The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of John Hesselins, late of Alleghany county, deceased, was read the second time and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the sale of the real estate of which Gabriel G. Van Horn died possessed, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read the first and second time by special order, agreed to and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Also the bill making a public landing place in Somerset county, and for other purposes, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read the first time.

Mr. A. D. Mitchell delivers a bill entitled, an act relating to the Poor-house and public ground thereto, belonging in Cecil county. Which was read the first and second time by special order and passed.

Mr. Hughes delivers a bill entitled, an act to increase the allowance to sheriffs for keeping prisoners in gaol and finding them victuals. Which was read.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act to confirm and make valid all the acts done by David Bowley a justice of the peace for Frederick county. Ordered, that Messrs. Thomas, Howard and Kilgour, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.
