Gentlemen of the House of Delegates

This bill merely proposes to enable the president of the United States to levy tolls in the Great Western road sufficient to preserve it in repair. This very excellent and very costly turnpike having been made by the United States, and being of mestimable advantage to this state, particularly to that portion through which it passe, a sense of justice, and our own interest demand, in the opinion of the senate, that anthority shou dbe given to the United States to collect revenue enough from travellers passing over this read to keep it in a coud tion to be permanently useful. When so great a benefit has been conferred on this highly favored state out of the resources of the union, to deny this most equitable and reasonable request from the national government, will be to subject Maryland to the reprorch and just indignation of the American people.
