A bill entitled, an act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to repair a road from Paul Hawk's church to the intersection of the Baltimore road near Charles Franklin's tavern in Frederick county, severally passed by that house December 18, 1815; and resolutions in favor of Aaron Jones, Jesse Powers and Josias Alvey, revolutionary soldiers. Which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Holbrook from the committee delivers the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of John Casson, and James Casson, heirs and representatives of William Casson, late of Caroline county, deceased. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Brown from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act to alter and repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government as preclude the senate from making any amendment to a money bill. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

TUESDAY, December 19, 1815.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Kent appeared in the senate.

The bill entitled, an act to erect a town in Frederick county, and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed with sundry amendments, and sent the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act to alter the times of holding the county courts in Frederick and Washington counties, was read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act in addition to an act entitled, an act for amending and reducing into system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans, and other representatives of deceased persons, was read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. N. Williams from the committee to whom was referred the petition of the Powhatan manufacturing company, delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Baltimore county. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Hebb from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act to authorise the president of the United States to erect toll gates on the Western road laid out and made by the United States, leading from Cumberland across the mountains towards the river Ohio, and for other purposes. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Hawkins from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act to authorise the sale of the real estate therein mentioned. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegate delivers a bill entitled, an act supplementary to the act entitled, an act to alter, straighten and amend the road therein mentioned, in Harford county, passed by that house December 18, 1815. A bill entitled, an act annulling the marriage of John Turner, and Ann O. Turner, of Talbot county. A bill entitled, an act authorising William Waller, late sheriff of Somerset county, to complete his collections; and a bill entitled, an act for the sale of the real estate of which Gabriel P. Van Horn died possessed, severally passed by that house, December 19, 1815. Which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Also returns the bill entitled, an act to alter the sixtieth section of the constitution and form of government, endorsed, "by the house of delegates, December 19, 1815," read the second time and will not pass.

The bill entitled, an act to regulate the mode of qualifying jurors for the trial of civil actions in the county courts, was read the second time and the question put, shall this bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act for the relief of the devisees of Thomas McCreery. A bill entitled, an act to authorise the sale of a part of the real estate of Benjamin Ricard. A bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road in Harford county. A bill entitled, an act authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of the surgical institution of Baltimore. A bill entitled, an act to authorise Christopher Johnson, of the city of Baltimore, to lease and let out the leasehold estate and property which belonged to Daniel Deady, deceased, severally passed by that house December 19, 1815; and resolutions in favor of Nehemiah Crawford, William Gates, Bostian Medlar, John Boone, and John Roby, revolutionary soldiers; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
