The bill entitled, an act to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government for the year eighteen hundred and fifteen, was read the second time and will not pass, and with the following message, sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, January 13, 1816.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

The senate have received the bill which passed your house appropriating money in the treasury for the payment of the civil list and other expenses of civil government for the year 1815. Matters being blended with that bill which in their opinion are not necessary to such application upon the true construction of the constitution, the senate have rejected it upon the ground of its being in their opinion a money bill, and that therefore the incorporation of such unnecessary matter is unconstitutional. They hope upon re-consideration you will expunge such objectionable matter; at the same time the senate wish it to be understood by your house that they are perfectly willing to pass a law enforcing a faithful performance of the duties of the printer to the state.

The resolution relative to transmitting a copy of an act repealing the fourth section of an act to incorporate a company to make an artificial road therein mentioned, was read the second time by special order and assented to.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning nine o'clock.

MONDAY, January 15.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Messrs. Johnson and Kent. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The resolution relative to transmitting a copy of an act repealing the fourth section of an act to incorporate a company to make an artificial road therein mentioned, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Brown from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act to ascertain and regulate officers fees. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill entitled an act to lay out and open a road from George Sheaffer's to the new cut road leading from Frederick town to Hughes' coaling ground, was read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the village of Liberty town to intersect the Baltimore and Reister's town turnpike road at or near the west end of the town of Westminster, was read the second time, passed with sundry amendments and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Queen Ann's county, was read the second time, passed with an amendment and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to lay out and make public a road in Baltimore county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, a supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the turnpike near Westminster to Taney town, thence with the main street through Emmitsburg to Troup's tavern; and the bill entitled, an act to open a road in Washington county, were severally read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act to authorise the drawing of a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of building a bridge over Britain's bay in Saint Mary's county.

A bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from or near Baltimore city in Baltimore county, through Liberty town in Frederick county to Hager's town in Washington county, severally passed by that house January 13, 1816.

A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Ignatius Pike, of Saint Mary's county. A bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the Baltimore and Frederick turnpike, at or near the fifty-fifth mile stone west of Middle town to the Potomac river near M'Shan's ferry.

A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Jeremiah Rymer alias Jeremiah Bean. A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Susan Rich and Samuel Rich, of Caroline county.

A bill entitled, an act to correct a mistake in a deed therein mentioned. A bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road near Hancock town in Washington county.

A bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the Frederick and Baltimore turnpike road, commencing at the west end of Frederick town to Harper's ferry on the Potomac river, severally passed by that house January 15, 1816; and a resolution in favor of John Gassaway, a revolutionary soldier.

Which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. Also return the bill entitled, an act to make valid a deed from William K. Clagett, of Baltimore county to Samuel A. Berry of Charles county, with the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, January 13, 1816.

*Gentlemen of the senate,*

We return you a bill entitled, an act to make valid a deed from William K. Clagett, of Baltimore county to Samuel A. Berry, of Charles county, which was sent down to us from your house, endorsed, "will not pass." As there are peculiar circumstances in connection with this case, exempting it from that sound legislative principle which forbids our interference in derogation of the law of the land, which furnishes a remedy; we beg leave to desire a re-consideration of this bill, and to hope that it will pass.
