

SATURDAY, *January, 20.*

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill entitled, an act to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the title of the bank of Dorchester. The bill entitled, an act to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the name of the Centreville bank of Maryland. The bill entitled, an act to increase the capital stock in the Hager's town bank. The bill entitled, an act to authorise the recording a certain deed of bargain and sale therein mentioned. The bill entitled, an act to authorise the recording of a certain deed of bargain and sale therein mentioned. The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of Eli Gibbons, late of Somerset county, deceased. The bill entitled, an act to revive and amend an act entitled, an act for establishing a company for opening and extending the navigation of the river Pocquoke; and the bill entitled, an act authorising the Levy court of Prince George's county, to levy annually on said county, money for the support of sundry persons as out pensioners, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in this state, and for other purposes, was read the second time by special order, passed with sundry amendments and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Susan Rich, and Samuel Rich, of Caroline county, was read the second time, passed with sundry amendments and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Fenwick presented a memorial from James H. McCulloch, and others, in behalf of free negroes, &c. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Fenwick, N. Williams and Hebb, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Nabb presented a petition from Robert Lloyd Tilghman, Tench Tilghman and William H. Tilghman, of Talbot county, praying a law to authorise the sale of certain real estate therein mentioned. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Nabb, Johnson and Brown, to consider and report thereon.

The resolution relative to the employment or harboring of run away negroes by the citizens of Pennsylvania, was read the second time by special order, dissented from and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Fenwick from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an additional supplement to the act entitled, an act relating to negroes, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned. Which was read the first time and referred to lie on the table.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of the Baltimore company, was read the second time, passed and sent to the house of delegate by the clerk.

On motion of Mr. Hebb, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from or near Baltimore city, in Baltimore county, through Liberty town in Frederick county to Hager's town in Washington county. Ordered; that Messrs. Hebb, L. Hollingsworth and Kent, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The bill entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road to lead from the cross roads near Richard Caton's limekiln, in Baltimore county, nearly in the direction of Jones' falls to the city of Baltimore, was read the second time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to extend Aisquith street in the city of Baltimore, passed by that house January 19, 1816. A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of William P. Patterson of Harford county. A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of John Richardson, late of Caroline county, deceased. A bill entitled, an act to authorise the Levy court of Harford county, to levy money for building a bridge. A bill entitled, an act authorising the conveyance of certain property therein mentioned. A bill entitled, an act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money to buy a lot of ground in Frederick town in Frederick county, and build a church and parsonage house thereon. A bill entitled, an act to ratify and protect the title of the Third Haven monthly meeting of Friends, commonly called Quakers, of Talbot county, in and to the lots of ground on which several meeting houses stand, and to incorporate certain members of their society as a body politic for their benefit. A bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Hager's town fire company, in Washington county. A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the heirs of Joseph Woodall, of Kent county, deceased. A bill entitled, an act respecting the Register of Wills in Saint Mary's county. A bill entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled, an act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county, and for other purposes. A bill entitled, an act authorising the sale of certain property therein mentioned, severally passed by that house January 20, 1816. A resolution relative to transmitting to the executive of Virginia a copy of the act for erecting a bridge over the river Potomac. A resolution authorising the governor and council to employ additional counsel to defend the suit commenced against the state by Jehu Chandler. A resolution extending the time of payment of the judgment obtained by the state against Alexander Boone and his securities. Resolutions in favor of John Sprigg Belt, and George Bateman, revolutionary soldiers; and the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, January 20, 1816.

*gentlemen of the Senate,*

We have had occasion from our regard to the best interests of the state to communicate at several times with you on the subject of an election of a senator in the congress of the United States. On the 15th of December last our first message was sent. This was suffered to sleep on your table until the 15th instant, notwithstanding the manifest injury to the public, from the want of a full representation that important branch of the general government. After the lapse of nearly a month during which interval the discussion of the treaty between the United States and the king of Great Britain, and other important questions, in which our state in common with its sister states had a deep concern, were pas-
