Stone, or to their joint order, the sum of thirteen hundred and sixty pounds and two pence half penny, (money advanced by the said General John H. Stone for proclamation warrants) out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 3, 1817.

RESOLVED, That Henry Steiner, Stephen Steiner, and Lewis Green, he and they are hereby authorised, under the direction of the governor and council, to cause to be fitted up one of the rooms in the east wing of the public barracks in Frederick-town, for the reception and safe keeping of the field-pieces of the artillery company in said town; and to have the carriages of said field-pieces repaired, and that the expense of fitting up said room, and of such repairs, be paid by the treasurer of the western shore, upon the order of the persons, or a majority of them, herein before named.

RESOLVED by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the governor and council be requested to have the work done in the chancery office for the safe keeping and preservation of public papers, by Washington Tuck, measured and valued, and to draw for the amount on the treasurer of the western shore, who is hereby directed to pay the same out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised, to direct the register of the chancery office to cause such record books as are in a state of decay, belonging to the chancery office, to be secured by repairing or rebinding them, and that they draw on the treasurer for such sum of sums of money as may be necessary to carry this resolution into effect, and that the treasurer pay the same out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.
