The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the vestry of Trinity parish, in Charles county, to raise by lottery a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Thomas Duvall of Prince-George's county; a bill, entitled, An act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money to finish the Warren meeting house, and walling in the yard of the same, in Baltimore county; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of a religious society in Frederick county called The United Brethren; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Robert Long and Virgil Sweezy of Baltimore county; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Liberty Fire Company in the city of Baltimore; a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower Solomon Davis, administrator of John Oneal, to sell certain real estate of the deceased; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of Garrison Forrest Academy in Baltimore county; a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the preservation of the breed of wild deer in Somerset and Dorchester counties; A bill, entitled, An act to improve and keep in order the streets in, and roads near, the town of St. Michael's in Talbot county; a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the division of the land therein mentioned; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And returns the bill, entitled, An act authorising the sale of the real estate of Samuel Wilson, late of Somerset county, deceased. Ordered to be engrossed. And the bill, entitled, An act providing for the appointment of an attorney-general, and of district attorneys in the several judicial districts of this state, and for Baltimore city court, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which were read the first time.

The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Frederick county, and the bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Frederick county, were severally read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Anne Arundel, Montgomery and Frederick counties, was read the second and third time by special order, and will pass with the proposed amendment.

The bill, entitled, An act authorising commissioners to purchase a fire engine for the use of the inhabitants of William's-Port in Washington county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, passed at November session eighteen hundred and nine, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for founding a college in the city or precincts of Baltimore, was read the second time.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a resolution in favour of Benjamin Murdock, and a resolution in favour of Samuel Hurst, old soldiers. Also a resolution in favour of the Methodist Church in Annapolis; in favour of Samuel Moale, trustee of Mark Alexander; Also authorising congress to make internal improvements in this state; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And delivers the engrossed bills from No. 1 to 30, inclusive, severally assented to by that house February 5, 1818; which were severally read and assented to.

Mr. Carmichael asked for leave of absence for Mr. Gale from Monday next for the remainder of the session, and the question being put, Shall the leave be granted? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The engrossed bills No. 31 to 40, inclusive, No. 51 and 52, from 67 to 71, from 92 to 94, from No. 111 to 120, inclusive, were severally read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The engrossed bills from No. 1 to No. 30, were read and assented to, and returned to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Gale from the committee reported a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Nicholas J. Watkins of the city of Annapolis; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Jackson, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to continue in force the several acts of assembly which would expire with the present session. Ordered, That Messrs. Jackson, Maxcy and Calvert, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The resolution repealing the resolution passed in the year 1814 relative to the executors of James Earle, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Thomas Duvall of Prince-George's county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of Samuel Moale trustee of Mark Alexander, was read the second and third time by special order, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Calvert, Ordered, That this house, the remainder of this session, will sit from 9 o'clock in the morning until 3 o'clock P. M. and from 6 P. M. until 9 P. M. for the dispatch of business.
