

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

NEGATIVE.

Mr. President, Messrs. Calvert, Carmichael, Hollyday, Magruder, Taney,—6.

So it was determined in the negative.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, February 14, 1818.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The resolution relative to the treasurer of the eastern shore, was read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill, entitled, An act extending the benefit of the insolvent laws to Junius W. Moore of Montgomery county, was read the third time, will not pass, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to appointments to offices of profit and trust by the governor and council, was read the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to ascertaining the regular variation of the magnetic needle, &c. was read the second, and by special order the third time, and the question being put, Shall this resolution be assented to? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE.

NEGATIVE.

Mr. President, Messrs. Emerson, Jackson, Taney.—4.

So it was determined in the affirmative, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of a religious society in Frederick county called The United Brethren, which was on further consideration passed.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the justices of the levy court of Anne Arundel county to appoint some person to take charge of the tobacco now in the old warehouse at Elk Ridge Landing, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act relating to vagrants in the city of Baltimore, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Hugh Foy, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table; a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish and regulate a market at Bridge-Town in Kent county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, and also to change the name of said place to Millington, endorsed by the house of delegates, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill, entitled, An act to confirm and make valid the proceedings of the levy court of Calvert county since the year eighteen hundred and fourteen, and for other purposes, endorsed by that house, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.—

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Lawrence Oneal of Montgomery county; the bill, entitled, An act to appoint trustees for the sale of the real estate of James Lackland, late of Montgomery county, deceased; a bill, entitled, An act to authorise Mary Ann Nelms, natural guardian of George Nelms and Ann Eliza Nelms, to convey the property therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act relating to the jurors of Montgomery county; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table; a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road in Prince-George's county; and the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry poor out pensioners of Anne-Arundel county; which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Nicholas J. Watkins of the city of Annapolis, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The resolution in favour of Mountjoy Bayley, was read the second, and by special order the third time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution authorising the treasurer of the western shore to sell and dispose of certain stock, was read the first, second and third time by special order, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John Barnes, was read the second and third time by special order and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise Arthur Craddock to bring a certain negro slave into this state, was read the third time and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Baltimore county to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, was read the third time and will pass with the proposed amendments; and sent to the house of delegates; which amendments were read and assented to by the house of delegates, with further amendments, which amendments were read and assented to, and the bill returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, An act to allow mileage in certain cases to jurors in Washington county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the engrossed bills from No. 140 to 145, and from No. 154 to 166, inclusive; which were read, assented to and returned to the house of delegates.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk:

BY THE SENATE, February 14, 1818.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We received your message of the 11th instant, proposing to close the session this day; we have delayed answering it, because at that time we could form no opinion from the state of the public business when the session could be closed. Within a few days past we have received several long important bills from your house, and we do not apprehend that we shall be able to close the session until Monday night.
