 Mr. Carmichael then moved to strike out the first section? Determined in the negative.  
 The bill was then on motion ordered to a third reading.  
 Mr. Carmichael moved to strike out "Chester-Town?" And the question being put, "Will the senate agree to strike out Chester-Town? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The senate met.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolutions: In favour of Cornelius Mills and others; in favour of Jonas Green; which were severally read the first, second, and third time, by special order, and assented to; the resolution relative to the sale of certain munitions of war; to authorise the treasurer to purchase certain copies of "Brice on Wills;" which were read the first, second and third time by special order, and assented to. Also a bill, entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts; a bill, entitled, An act incorporating the Baltimore Second Dispensary, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. The resolution for compiling the laws, passed by that house, was ordered to be engrossed. The resolution in favour of the messenger to the executive, was read the second and third time by special order, and assented to; the resolution in favour of Aaron Simmons, in favour of Solomon Lowe, were severally read the third time and dissented from. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. And returns the following bills: a bill, entitled, An act authorising Marsham Parker, late sheriff, and Aquilla G. Bowen late collector, of Calvert county, to complete their collections; a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act relating to coroners and sheriffs, passed at November session 1799, ch. 1; a bill, entitled, An act relating to vagrants in the city of Baltimore; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to be called The Washington and Baltimore Canal Company; which were severally passed by the house of delegates. Severally ordered to be engrossed. A bill, entitled, An act to continue in force, the acts of assembly which would expire the present session, endorsed by the house of delegates, will pass with the proposed amendments;" which were read, and assented to. Ordered to be engrossed. The bill, entitled, A supplement to the act to provide for the administration of justice in cases of crimes and misdemeanors in the city and precincts of Baltimore; the bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road in Prince-George's and Anne Arundel counties, passed December session 1817; were severally read the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The bill, entitled, An act to increase the pay of the judges of the orphans court for the several counties herein mentioned; the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Elizabeth Hutton of Baltimore county; the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Lawrence Oneal of Montgomery county, were severally read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The resolution in favour of general John Cassaway, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and assented to.

The bill, entitled, An act to provide for the erection of a bridge over Patapsco Falls at Ellicott's old upper mills, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass. Sent to the house of delegates, with the following message:

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Richard Barnaby of Cecil county, was read the third time and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Salisbury in Somerset county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act for the better protection of slave-holders in the several counties therein mentioned, was read the first, second and third time by special order, and will pass with the proposed amendments.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry poor out pensioners of Anne-Arundel county, was read the third time by special order and will pass. The bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees

of the Baltimore Foundling Hospital, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass. The bill, entitled, An act enlarging the powers of the trustees of the poor of Harford county, was read the third time and will pass. The bill, entitled, An act relating to the jurors of Montgome-

ry county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.
