

On motion of Mr. Winchester, the senate agreed to reconsider the bill relating to Baltimore city court, when Mr. Winchester moved to strike out the first section? Determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of the Union school in Durham Parish in Baltimore county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Walter Edelen of Charles county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Jane Gaiher of Anne-Arundel county; and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John Frey and Thomas Cole of Cecil county; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Jan 26, 1819.

Mr. Taney from the committee reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish an Academy at Liberty-town, in Frederick county, which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Jackson from the committee reported a bill, entitled, An act to alter the time of holding the county court in Somerset county; which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Charles Yeger and Caroline Yeger; and on reconsideration will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. 1. In the title of the bill strike out the words "and Caroline Yeger of Frederick county" 2. Strike out the whole of the bill after the title, and insert the following: "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That all deeds heretofore made by any person or persons to Charles Yeger of Frederick county, for any lands, situated in this state, shall have the same force and effect as if the said Charles Yeger had been a citizen of this state, duly naturalized at the time of the making of such deed or deeds." "And be it enacted, That Caroline Yeger, the wife of the said Charles Yeger, be, and she is hereby declared and made capable in law to take, have and hold, and to transmit and transfer, by descent, devise or otherwise, any lands situated in this state, in the same manner as if she were a native citizen of this state"

The bill, entitled, An act to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in this state, was returned by the house of delegates, endorsed, "read the second time, and will pass with the proposed amendments." which amendments were read and assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. Also the bill, entitled, An act to quiet possessions and to prevent suits at law; and the bill, entitled, An act to authorise Ruth Tolson to complete the collections of John Tolson her deceased husband, late collector of Queen-Anne's county; endorsed, "read the second time and will pass" Severally ordered to be engrossed. And the bill, entitled, An act to exempt from taxation certain plate belonging to the estate of Col. George Armistead, deceased; which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, January 27, 1819.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Hollyday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Palmer, senior, and others, of Prince George's county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendment, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendment proposed. After the word "authorised" 2d line of the bill insert "so long as the said court shall see fit."

Mr. Carmichael asked and obtained leave of absence for Mr. Hollyday.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower Benjamin Lawrence, and Susan Ann his wife, to sell and convey the property therein mentioned, was read the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Leah W. Hubbell, of Dorchester county, was read the third time, and the question being put, Shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follows:

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Mary-Ann Stern of Anne-Arundel county, was read the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of Walter L. Price, was read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On motion of Mr. Emerson, the senate agreed to reconsider the bill for the relief of Leah W. Hubbell; and on further consideration, the question was put, Shall the bill pass with the proposed amendments? Determined in the affirmative, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendments proposed. Strike out the words, "after his death" 2d line. 3d section, and insert the words, "is and." 2. Add the following words to the end of the bill, "to the said Leah W. Hubbell"

The bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Matthew Cannon, and Henrietta Cannon of Somerset county, was read the second time, and referred to Messrs. Jackson, Parnham, and West to consider and report thereon.
