The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, December 22, 1819.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

John E. Howard, junior, esquire, appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.

The bill to prevent bullet playing in Washington county, with the amendments, was sent to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Maxcy, Leave given to bring in a bill for the relief of Willy Reynolds, of Anne Arundel county. Ordered, That Messrs. Maxcy, Howard and Parnham, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Maxcy from the committee delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Willy Reynolds of Anne-Arundel county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, An act to empower the county court of Queen-Anne's county to divide the real estate therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the better protection of slave holders in the several counties therein mentioned, so far as relates to Talbot and Dorchester counties; a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act authorising the levy court of Calvert county to levy a sum of money on the assessable property of said county for the purposes therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of David Harry, junior, of Washington county; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of the Reformed and Evangelical Lutheran Church on Silver run, Frederick county, called St. Mary's Church; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of a Methodist meeting house in Queen Anne's county, and for other purposes; and a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Wilson Carey Sedden, of the state of Virginia. Also the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, December 21, 1819.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and requested, to pay to the treasurer of the Female Union Society, for the promotion of Sabbath Schools, out of the portion of the school funds of Baltimore county belonging to the city, for the year eighteen hundred and twenty, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, and out of the same fund, annually thereafter, the sum of one hundred dollars, and out of the portion of the said fund for the year eighteen hundred and twenty, belonging to Baltimore county, and annually thereafter, the sum of fifty dollars, for the use and benefit of the Sabbath schools established under the superintendance of the said Female Union Society in the city and county of Baltimore; that is to say, the annual sum of fifty dollars for the use of the Female Sabbath schools established in Baltimore county, and the first above mentioned sums for the use of said schools in the city.

The bill to authorise the levy court of Charles county to dispose of the property therein mentioned, was read the second and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Richard Dove and Eleanor his wife, of Anne Arundel county; a bill, entitled, An act supplementary to an act, entitled, An act for the support of Evan Price; and a bill, entitled, An act to allow Arnold T. Winsor, late sheriff and collector of Montgomery county, further time to complete his collection; which were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to repeal an act passed at December session eighteen hundred and eighteen, entitled, An act to regulate the manner of granting licenses to retailers of spirituous liquors, and to prevent persons from dealing with free negroes after sun-set in Kent county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to authorise William A. Palmore to import and bring into this state the negro slave therein mentioned, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and postponed for further consideration.

The resolution in favour of Henry Darden was read the second and third time by special order, and postponed for further consideration.
