MONDAY, December 18, 1820.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday except Mr. Emerson, Mr. Gale and Mr. Hughlett. Mr. Maxcy appeared in the senate. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The bill to authorise William Jordan, late collector of the sixth election district of Baltimore county, to complete his collection, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a resolution in favour of William Byas, of Dorchester county, a revolutionary soldier; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. Also a bill, entitled, An act to annul the marriage of Joseph Price, and Sarah his wife; a bill entitled, An act authorising Robert W. Kent, of Anne-Arundel county, to remove certain negroes into the state of Maryland; a bill entitled, A supplement to an act passed at December session 1816, for the benefit of the securities of Thomas Thompson, collector of Dorchester county, deceased; a bill entitled, An act to repeal the act, entitled, An act authorising certain alterations in Baltimore county and city court rooms; which were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And returns a bill entitled, An act to authorise the erection of a warehouse in the village of Greensborough, in Caroline county; and a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Joseph Richardson, clerk of Caroline county court, endorsed 'will pass.' Ordered to be engrossed.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of M. Kim's school in the city of Baltimore, and on motion of Mr. Maxcy, the question was put, Will the senate receive the following as amendments to said bill? 1st. After the word 'and' 13th and 14th lines of the preamble strike out 'it is hereby,' and insert 'Be it.' 2. In 1st line 1st section, insert after the word 'there' the word 'shall.' Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill being read throughout, the question was put, Shall the bill as amended pass? Determined in the affirmative.

The bill for the relief of David Waggaman, of Washington county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass

The bill to authorise James H. Wathen, collector of St. Mary's county, to complete his collections, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendment:

At the end of the bill add: 'And be it enacted, That the said James H. Wathen, before he derives any benefit from or under this act, shall lodge a copy of his collection books in the clerks office of St. Mary's county, to be open for the inspection of all persons interested in the same.'

The bill for the relief of Isaac Lyon, of Frederick county, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to authorise the levy court of Dorchester county to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The bill authorising Henry E. Coalman to remove a certain negro slave from the state of Louisiana into this state for the use of Peregrine Ward 3d of Cecil county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The bill for the benefit of James Scott, of Allegany county, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill authorising John V. Price, late collector of the first collection district in Cecil county, to complete his collection, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendment:

At the end of the bill add: 'And be it enacted, That the said John V. Price, before he derives any benefit from or under this act, shall lodge a copy of his collection books in the clerk's office of Cecil county, to be open for the inspection of all persons interested in the same.'

The bill annulling the marriage of Thomas Knock and Margaret Knock of Baltimore county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The senate adjourns until to morrow morning 10 o'clock.
