The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank in the city of Baltimore, and to an act, entitled, A supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, was read the second time by special order and laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Emerson, the following message was read:

BY THE SENATE, January 12, 1821.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

In our message of the 14th day of December last, to your honourable house, respecting the recommendation of a proper person to his excellency the governor to be commissioned as register of wills for Anne-Arundel county, we informed you, that we expected information as to the qualifications of other persons who were candidates for that appointment, and that as soon as we should have received the same would not fail to inform your honourable body thereof. Having received it, we are prepared forthwith to ballot for a person, to be jointly recommended to fill the office of register of wills for Anne-Arundel county, and have nominated Lewis Sutton, in addition to the gentlemen named in your message, and have appointed Messrs. Emerson and Maxcy, in conjunction with the gentlemen named in your message, for that purpose, to count the ballots and report thereon.

The question was put, Will the senate adopt the said message? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The bill to provide for the support and maintenance of debtors actually confined in prison, was read the second time by special order and laid on the table.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank in the city of Baltimore, and to an act, entitled, A supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, was read the third time by special order and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed: 1. Insert the word 'And' before the words 'Be it enacted,' 1st line 2d sec. 2. Strike out the word 'that' 2d line same sec. 3. Strike out the word 'that' 10th line 2d page and insert 'and.' 4. Strike out the word 'that' 12th line same page. 5. Strike out the words 'discounts or' same line same page. 6. Insert the word 'And' before the words 'be it enacted,' 1st line 3d sec. 7. Strike out the word 'that' 2d line 3d page. 8. Insert the word 'And' before the words 'Be it enacted' 1st line 4th section.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a resolution in favour of the armorer; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of John Herbert of Washington county; a bill, entitled, An act to allow Daniel Schnebly, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, further time to complete his collections; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William H. S. Boswell of Prince George's county; a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned in Cecil county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Benjamin Rawlings, of the city of Baltimore; a bill, entitled, An act to make void a deed therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Charles Hutchinson; a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the town of Westminster, in Frederick county, through Harman's Gap, to Hager's town, in Washington county; a bill, entitled, An act to protect the navigation of Chester river; and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Philo D. Forrest of the city of Baltimore, which were read the first time and laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Harper to reconsider the bill to preserve to families their necessary bed, bedding and wearing apparel, the question was put, Will the senate reconsider the said bill? Determined the affirmative, and the bill referred to Messrs. Harper, Carmichael and Gale.

The senate adjourns until to morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 13, 1821.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank in the city of Baltimore, and to an act, entitled, A supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, were sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to provide for the repairs of the court house in Prince-George's county, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise James Stevens, and Mary Ann, alias Anna-Maria his wife, to sell the lot or parcel of ground therein mentioned; a bill, entitled, An act relating to the school funds for the city of Baltimore; a bill, entitled, An act to permit John Patterson, of Baltimore county, to bring certain negroes from Virginia into this state; a bill, entitled, An act to facilitate the collection of the county charges in Dorchester county; a bill, entitled, An act authorising Letitia Rochester to convey the lands therein mentioned, and for other purposes; and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Otho Sprigg, of Frederick county; which were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And returns the bill for the relief of the sheriffs and collectors of the several counties in this state, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill to authorise and empower Elizabeth Marbury Spalding, widow and administratrix of George H. Spalding, late sheriff and collector of Charles county, to complete his collections, was read the third time and will not pass.

The bill for the better administration of justice in the several counties in this state, was read the third time and re-committed.
