

Mr. Jackson from the committee reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Littleton Dennis Teackle, of Somerset county; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill authorising a lottery to complete the German Reformed Church in Middletown, Frederick county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The bill authorising a lottery for the benefit of the Rockville and Barnes's town Roman Catholic congregations, in Montgomery county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The bill for changing the name of Charles-town, in Charles county, to that of Port Tobacco, for securing the titles of proprietors of lots and houses therein, and for the regulation and improvement of the said town, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to authorise a lottery or lotteries to raise a sum of money for the purpose of making a turnpike road from Boonsborough, to Hager's town, and from Boonsborough to Williamsport, in Washington county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, An act to repeal the act of assembly, entitled, An act to avoid suits at law, passed at December session eighteen hundred and eighteen, chapter two hundred and sixteen; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Robert Morris, of Talbot county; a bill, entitled, An act to change the names of James Woodward and Harriet Woodward, of Anne-Arundel county, to that of James Clagett and Harriet Clagett; and a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the benefit of the University of Maryland, passed at December session 1816, chap. 78; which were read the first time and laid on the table. And returns the bill for the benefit of John Barnes, clerk of Charles county, accompanied by the following message:

And delivers a resolution in favour of the Maryland University; which was read and laid on the table. And returns the bill for the benefit of the executors of Joseph Thornburgh, of Baltimore county, endorsed "will pass" Ordered to be engrossed.

On motion of Mr. Gale, the question was put, Will the senate reconsider the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and for other purposes, passed at December session 1819. Resolved in the affirmative, and referred to Messrs. Jackson, Emerson and Gale.

The bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for completing an Episcopal Church in Baltimore county, was read the second, and by special order third time, and will not pass.

The bill to pay the civil list and other expences of civil government, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill to provide for the payment of costs in the case of forfeited recognizances, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The bill authorising and empowering the levy court of the several counties therein mentioned to discontinue out pensioners, and for other purposes, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the relief of negro Ann, and her three children, of Frederick county, was read the third time and will pass.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods, and for other purposes, was read the second time, and referred to Messrs. Taney, Maxcy and Carmichael.

The report and resolutions relative to appropriations of public land for the purposes of education, was read the third time, and on motion of Mr. Carmichael, the further consideration thereof was postponed until to morrow.

On motion of Mr. Carmichael, Leave given to bring in a bill to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of Jesse Bodle as a justice of the peace for Kent county. Ordered, That Messrs. Carmichael, West and Hughlett, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Carmichael reports the said bill; which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, and will pass.

The senate adjourns until to morrow morning 10 o'clock.
