The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising the making of a public landing at Dockery's Point, in Somerset county; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The amendments to the bill for the benefit of the Baltimore General Dispensary, were read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods, and for other purposes, was read the third time and will pass with the proposed amendment: Amendment proposed Strike out from the word "that" 2d line enacting clause to the end thereof, and insert "the selling or bartering of any saddles, saddlery, shoes, boots or hats, by any mechanic residing in this state, and accustomed to manufacture any of the articles above mentioned, or the selling or bartering of any salt, salted fish, or plaster of paris, by any person whatsoever, shall not be deemed or taken to make such mechanic, or other person, a hawker and pedlar, or a retailer in merchandize, within the meaning of the acts of assembly requiring hawkers and pedlars and retailers as aforesaid, to obtain a license for carrying on such trade or business, provided that no mechanic shall be deemed a resident of this state, within the meaning of this law, unless he shall have actually resided therein for the space of twelve months before the selling or bartering above mentioned.

Mr. Gale from the committee reports a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The resolution in favour of Elizabeth Handy, was read the second and third time by special order, and the question put, Will the senate assent to the same? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

SATURDAY, February 10, 1821.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution in favour of the Maryland University; the resolution in favour of Elizabeth Handy; the supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the benefit of the University of Maryland, passed at Dec. session 1816, ch. 78; the supplement to the act, entitled, An act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods, and for other purposes; the bill to exempt a lottery therein mentioned from the tax imposed thereon; the bill to enable Hezekiah Niles, of the city of Baltimore, to dispose of certain books in the manner therein mentioned; the bill relative to making of a public landing place and road in Somerset county; the bill for the relief of Thomas Cole, of Cecil county; the supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the relief of John King, and certain other securities of William S. Handy, late collector of Somerset county; and the bill authorising the transcribing and rebinding of records in the office of register of wills in Anne Arundel county, and for other purposes, were sent to the house of delegates. Also the bill respecting an application for a road in Baltimore county court by Thomas Owings.

The further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The supplement to an act to erect a bridge over the narrows of Kent Island, in Queen Anne's county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. 1. In 2d line 1st sec. strike out the word "that." 2. Add the following sec. "And be it enacted, That John Denny and John Price be and are hereby appointed commissioners, in addition to the commissioners appointed in the act to which this is a supplement, with the same powers and authority vested in the commissioners by the original act and the supplement. Sent to house of delegates.

The bill for the more effectual prevention of crimes and reformation of offenders, was read the third time and will pass.

The resolution in favour of Elizabeth L. Gassaway, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and the question put, Will the senate assent to the same? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:
