

Also a resolution relative to the wing dam in Susquehanna river; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Jacob Stouffer of Frederick county; a bill, entitled, A further additional supplementary act to the act entitled, An act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers; a bill, entitled, An act for altering the times of holding the courts of Somerset and Worcester counties; a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Charles county to rebuild a tobacco warehouse at Cedar Point in William and Mary Parish in said county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Charlotte Warfield of Montgomery county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John McCall of Frederick county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Sally Handy of Dorchester county; a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the name of George Charles Townes, to that of George Charles Thompson; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Harriott Matthews, of Baltimore county; and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Maria W. B. Beckwith of Talbot county; which were read the first time and laid on the table. Also a bill, entitled, An act to declare void certain deeds therein mentioned, and to confirm others; which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and laid on the table.

And returns the bill to empower Thomas Chase, of Anne Arundel county, to sell the property therein mentioned, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill to incorporate the trustees of Taylor's Island Seminary, in Dorchester county, was read the second and third time by special order and will pass with the proposed amendment: Amendment proposed. In 2d line 1st sec strike out the words "Jacob Travers" and insert "Moses Geoghegan."

The bill to repeal the act of assembly, entitled, An act to avoid suits at law, passed at Dec. ses. 1818, ch. 216, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and the question put, Shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The bill to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned in Cecil county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The bill authorising Edmond Henry Contee to remove certain negroes into the state of Maryland; the bill to incorporate the Medical Society of Baltimore; the bill for the relief of the Library Company of Baltimore; the bill relating to cases removed for trial within the sixth, fifth and third judicial districts; the bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Dickens of the city of Baltimore; the further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery or lotteries in the city of Baltimore, passed at Dec. ses. 1811 ch. 87; the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at Nov. ses. 1805; the bill to authorise Mary Young, of the city of Baltimore, to import and bring into this state from the state of Virginia a certain negro slave; and the bill for the benefit of the Havre-de-Grace Bank, were read the second time and laid on the table.

MONDAY, February 12, 1821.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The message relative to signing and sealing the laws, the resolution in favour of Elizabeth L. Gassaway; the bill to incorporate the trustees of Taylor's Island Seminary in Dorchester county; the bill to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned in Cecil county, the bill to repeal the act of assembly, entitled, An act to avoid suits at law passed at December session 1818 ch. 216; the bill for the more effectual prevention of crimes and reformation of offenders; and the engrossed bills No. 112, 113, 114, 115, 116, were sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the engrossed bills from No. 83 to 91, inclusive, from No. 98 to 111, inclusive, and from No. 117 to 123, inclusive, which were read, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

On reconsideration, the bill to alter the names of Nathaniel Mortimer Magruder, &c. will pass. Sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to provide for erecting a wharf at the town of Queen-Anne, in Prince-George's county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass. Sent to the house of delegates.

The bill respecting certain roads in Prince-George's county, was read the third time, and the question put, Shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE.—Mr. President, Messrs. Cresap, Harper, Jackson, Parnham, West.—6.

NEGATIVE.—Messrs. Carmichael, Emerson, Gale, Hughlett, Magruder.—5.
