

TUESDAY, January 1, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill authorising George A. Dunkel of the city of Baltimore, to remove a certain negro slave, from Berkeley county Virginia, into this state, was read a third time and will not pass.

The act to authorise Thomas Morris of Talbot county, to bring into this state a certain negro slave therein mentioned, was read a third time and will pass.

The bill entitled, An act for appointing a printer to the state, was read a third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments. Amendments proposed. 1st, insert "of this state" after the word "assembly" in the third line of the 2nd section. 2nd At the end of the 2nd section insert, "and it shall also be his duty to print in the same manner, a number of the Votes and Proceedings of each session of the said General Assembly, over and above the number required by the said act of 1790, chapter 51 section 3, as shall be sufficient for each of the Judges and Justices of the Peace of this state." 3rd. Alter the word "laws" in the 7th line of the 3rd section, insert "and Votes and Proceedings of the general assembly of Maryland," and strike out the whole of the 8th line in the same section. 4th, After the word "enter" in the 9th line, insert the word "into" 5th, At the end of the 4th section, insert "And in case such person accepts said appointment, he shall within fifteen days thereafter, enter into the bond required of the printer appointed by this act, and in his neglect or refusal to enter into said bond, within the time aforesaid, he shall be subject to the same penalty and forfeiture as is provided by the 4th section of this law" 6th, Strike out the four last words of the last section.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An act to authorise Elijah Weems of Anne Arundel county, to bring into this state a certain negro slave therein mentioned; which was read the first time, and laid on the table.

Mr Miller presented the petition of a number of citizens of Cecil county, against the Susquehanna Canal Wing-dam, which was read and referred to Messrs Miller, Johnson and Brownley.

The bill for the relief Benedict and Alexis Boone, was read the third time and will pass.

The bill for the revaluation of real and personal property in Calvert county, was read the second time, amended and laid on the table.

The bill authorising William Renoe of Charles county, to bring into this state a certain negro slave therein mentioned, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to authorise Wm. G. Pemberton of Charles county, to bring into this state certain negroes therein mentioned, was read a third time and will pass.

The bill entitled, An act to authorise William Pemberton of Charles county, to bring into this state certain negroes therein mentioned; the bill entitled, An act for the relief of Benedict and Alexis Boone; the bill to authorise Robert Morris of Talbot county, to bring into this state a certain negro slave therein mentioned, and the bill authorising George A. Dunkel of the city of Baltimore, to remove a certain negro slave from Berkeley county Virginia, into this state, were sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the bill entitled, An act to repeal the act entitled, An act authorising certain alterations in Baltimore county and city court rooms, with the following message; which was read.

The bill entitled, An act for appointing a Printer to the State, was returned to the house of delegates.

The bill to confirm an act to alter, change and repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state as relate to the division of Queen Ann's county into election districts, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of Capt James Allen, of Cecil county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The consideration of the bill to alter the time of meeting of the general assembly of this state and for other purposes, was on motion, postponed until Monday the 7th inst.

The bill for the revaluation of real and personal property in Kent county, was on motion, made the order of the day for Monday the 14th inst.

The bill authorising and empowering the levy court of Saint Mary's county, to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of the idiot son of Samuel Thompson, of said county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of Michael C. Sprigg, of Allegany county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to confirm an act to repeal all that part of the constitution and form of government as relates to the division of Washington county into five separate election districts and for other purposes, passed at the last session, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The consideration of the bill authorising commissioners to make alterations in the election districts of Montgomery county, was on motion postponed until Monday the 7th inst.
