

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

The bill to make valid a release of a mortgage from Thomas Jenkins of Munroe county and state of Indiana, to James Dorsey (of John) of Calvert county and state of Maryland, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned; the bill for the relief of Molly Bateman of Charles county, and the bill for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, were severally read a second time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill to alter a certain road in Harford county; a bill for the benefit of Saint John's college; a bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act to provide for the opening and extension of Pratt street in the city of Baltimore, and a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act to provide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and for the administration of justice therein, which were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

On motion the question was put, Will the senate proceed to the election of a director on the part of the state for the bank of Baltimore. Resolved in the affirmative.

The senate proceeded to said election, and the ballot, being deposited in the ballot-box, on examination thereof it appeared that Wm. Dickinson had 9 votes and Charles C. Egerton had 4 votes. Whereupon it was declared in the senate that Wm. Dickinson, having had a majority of the votes of the attending members, was duly elected by the senate, a director of the bank of Baltimore, on the part of the state.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill to alter the time of meeting of the general assembly of this state, and for other purposes, which was read the third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act regulating the inspection of tobacco, and after some time spent in debate of the same, The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

THURSDAY, January 10, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The President laid before the senate a letter from Tench Tilghman, enclosing a report of the commissioners of the school fund for Talbot county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Dickinson, Johnson and Quinton.

Mr. Miller from the committee reports a bill entitled, An act to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned, was read a second time, and referred to Messrs. Price, Claude and Orrell.

Mr. McKim presented the Memorial of sundry members of the society of friends or people called Quakers, of eastern district of Baltimore, praying a law to vest the title of certain property in certain persons; which was read and referred to Messrs. McKim, Johnson and Miller.

The bill for the relief of the infant children of Levin H. Campbell late of Dorchester county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the relief of James C. Wheeler of Talbot county, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Wootton, Miller, Bronley, Chambers and Bowie.

The bill entitled a further supplement to the act entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill relative to the making of a public landing place and road in Somerset county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to encourage the destruction of Crows in Calvert county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of Peter Tingstrom of Frederick county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act to establish a Bank, and incorporate a company to be styled the Bank of Westminster, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of the trustees of the Catholic Cathedral Church of Baltimore, was read a second time and laid on the table.

On motion the consideration of the bill providing for the appointment of Attorney General with the amendments to the same proposed by the house of delegates, was postponed until Monday next.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act incorporating into one the several acts relating to constables' fees, was read a third time and the consideration of the same postponed until to-morrow.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a resolution relative to public property; a bill for the relief David Imbrie of the city of Baltimore; a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act for the improvement of the public roads in Kent county, and the bill to make valid two deeds therein mentioned, and the bill authorising the levy court of Washington county, to appoint commissioners to divide said county into seven election districts and for other purposes.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act regulating the inspection of tobacco.

On motion by Mr. McKim the question was put will the senate agree to strike out from the word 'by' in the 3rd line in the 2nd section, to the end of the section? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follows:
