Mr Johnson from the committee reports a bill authorising the erection of a New ware house, for the inspection of Tobacco in the city of Baltimore, which was read the first time and laid on the table. The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 11, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. Mr. Wootton appeared in the senate. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion, the bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, an act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, was made the order of the day for Tuesday next.

The resolution relative to public property; the bill entitled, An act for the relief of David Imbrie, of the city of Baltimore; the supplement to an act for the improvement of the public roads in Kent county; the bill to make valid two deeds therein mentioned; the bill authorising the Ivy court of Washington county to appoint commissioners to divide said county into seven election districts, and for other purposes, and the bill for the improvement of the navigation of the river Susquehannah, were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned, was read a third time and will not pass.

The bill for the relief of Molly Bateman, of Charles county, was read a third time and will pass.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act for the distribution of a certain fund for the establishment of free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, was read a second time. On motion the question was put, Will the senate strike out the word "levy," throughout the bill, and insert "orphans?" Determined in the affirmative.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act to provide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state and for the administration of justice therein, was read a second time and referred to Messrs Johnson, Dickinson and Wootton.

The bill authorising the erection of a new warehouse for the inspection of tobacco in the city of Baltimore, was read by special order a second and third time and will pass.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 12, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill to authorise the establishment of an additional warehouse in the city of Baltimore for the inspection of tobacco; the bill for the relief of Molly Bateman, of Charles county; the bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned, and the bill to alter the time of meeting of the General Assembly of this state, and for other purposes, were sent to the house of delegates.

Mr McKim presented the petition of the president and directors of the City bank of Baltimore; which was read and referred to Messrs McKim, Brownley and Dickinson.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill to authorise William D. Davidson, to bring into this state a certain negro therein mentioned; a bill for the revaluation of real and personal property in Cecil county; a bill to open a road in Baltimore county; a bill for the benefit of Ebenezer T. Massy and Emily Ann his wife; a bill to provide for the building a bridge over Beaver creek in Washington county; a bill for the benefit of the heirs of Mary Logan, of Harford county, deceased; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table. A second bill to incorporate the Baltimore society for the encouragement of industry; which was read the first and by special order a second time and referred to Messrs McKim, Bowie and Miller.

The president laid before the senate a report of the trustees of the Rockville academy; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the council delivers a communication from the executive, enclosing a communication from the directors of the academy for the education of the deaf and dumb in the state of Pennsylvania, and recommending the establishment of a similar institution in this state; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned was read a third time and will not pass.

The bill for the benefit of St. John's college, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act incorporating into one the several acts relating to constable's fees, was read a third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments. Amendments proposed. 1st. In the 5th line 1st section, strike out the word "commission," and insert the words "for his poundage fees." 2nd. In the 6th line of the same section, strike out the word "commission" and insert the words, "his poundage fee." 3rd. In the 7th line, same section after the word "residue," insert the words, "to be charged and recovered in the same manner that the sheriffs of this state are authorised to charge and recover similar fees, and that each constable shall receive for serving execution on body and return thereof, the sum of thirty three and one third cents." 4th. In the tenth line same section, after the word "supplement," insert "or in any other law." 5th. In the second line of the proviso after the word "the" insert "said fieri facias or." 6th. In the 3rd line of the proviso after the word "be," insert the words "levied or." 7th. In the last line of the proviso, after the word "said," insert the word "poundage."

The consideration of the bill to encourage the destruction of crows in Calvert county, was postponed until Wednesday next.
