and education of his three children: *Provided*, that the said trustee give bond with security to be approved of by said court, conditioned for the faithful performance of the trust created by this act.

*And be it enacted*, That said trustee shall annually report in writing to the said court the situation of said trust estate, shewing particularly the value of said estate on hand; the expenses of the support of the wife, and the support and education of the children for the year.

*And be it enacted*, That the said court shall have authority to appoint another trustee to carry into effect the provisions of this act, on the death or removal out of the county of any such trustee by them appointed.

*And be it enacted*, That this trust shall cease and expire if the said John Vincent Cooksey should be pardoned and return to this state to reside, or should die, and that the trustee appointed by this act shall have complete authority to make any contract or contracts relating to said trust property, and to bring such suits in his own name as may be necessary to enforce said contract or contracts, and to preserve any of the estate, real, personal or mixed, that he may get by virtue of this act, and to appear and prosecute or defend all suits now brought or hereafter to be brought to which said Cooksey may be a party; *Provided always*, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect or in any way impair any bona fide contract or contracts now made or that may hereafter be made by said John Vincent Cooksey, relating to or concerning any of the said property or estate of said Cooksey." In the title of the bill strike out the words 'heirs and widow' and insert 'children and wife.' Sent to the house of delegates.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill to authorise William Renoe, of Charles county, to remove a certain negro into the state of Maryland; which was read a third time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates.

The supplement to the act for the improvement of the public roads in Kent county, was read a third time and laid on the table.

The bill for the re-valuation of real and personal property in Kent county, was read a third time and laid on the table.

The supplement to the act to provide for a new assessment, and to appoint collectors of the county tax in and for the city and county of Baltimore, was read a third time, and will pass with the proposed amendment. Amendment proposed. In the 6th line 1st section after the words 'per centum,' insert 'as on the amount to be collected in the county' Sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to authorise Cristian Kemp, guardian of Virginia Baker and Corbin Baker, of Frederick county, to remove into this state from the state of Virginia, certain negroes therein mentioned, was read a third time and referred to Messrs Wootton, Cockey and Quinton.

The bill for the benefit of Henry Truitt, of Worcester county, was read a third time and will pass. Sent to the house of delegates.

The bill for the benefit of Ebenezer T. Massey and Emily Ann, his wife, was read a third time and referred to Messrs Chambers, M'Kim and Miller.

The supplement to the act for the benefit of the Havre de-Grace Bank, was read a second, and by special order a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Dr. Colin M'Kenzie, was read a second time, and laid on the table.

The resolution in favor of Elizabeth Poe, was referred to Messrs Chambers, Johnson, Kent, Quinton and Brownley.

Mr. M'Kim, from the committee to whom was referred the petition of Robert Sinclair, reported a bill relating to the opening of Bottle alley, in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill annulling the marriage of Mary Parker, of Queen Ann's county, and State of Maryland and Isaac Parker, of Washington county, and state of Maryland; a bill for the benefit of Captain James Mitchell, of Cecil county; a bill annulling the marriage of Adelaide Y. Low, and Bradley S. A. Low, of Frederick county; a bill to prevent swine and geese from going at large in the village of Friendship, in Anne Arunde county; a bill for the benefit of Basil L. Stocker and Ann his wife, William Humes, Levi Stocker and Sarah his wife, and Nancy Humes, and a bill authorising the court of Harford county, to adjudge to be laid out and opened certain roads; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table. Also a bill to annul the marriage of Terence Dooris, of Talbot county, and Catharine Dooris, otherwise called Catharine Early; which was read the first and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs Chambers, Quinton, Dickinson, Cockey and Wootton.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution to compensate the commissioners for examining the turnpike road; which was read and laid on the table.

The senate adjourned until to morrow morning 10 o'clock.

## TUESDAY, JANUARY 22, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr Wootton from the committee to whom was referred the consideration of the bill to authorise Christian Kemp, as guardian of Virginia Baker and Corbin Baker, of Frederick county, to remove into the state of Maryland from the state of Virginia, certain negroes therein mentioned, reported that they had taken the same under their consideration, and were of opinion that the bill ought to pass. The question was then put, Shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative, and the bill was returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill for the benefit of Mary Scott, of Charles county; a bill relative to the town of Elkton, in Cecil county; a bill to authorise a lottery to raise a
