The senate resumed the consideration of the amendments to the bill providing for the appointment of an Attorney General, and on motion the question was put, will the senate postpone the consideration of the amendments until Monday next? Determined in the negative.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 23, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the benefit of the Stockholders of the Susquehannah bridge; the additional supplement to the act to regulate the inspection of lumber in the city and county of Baltimore, the bill to authorise the congregation of the German reformed church in Middle-town in Frederick county, to raise a sum of money by letery to defray the expense in part for building their church in said town, and the bill to enlarge the powers of the trustees of the poor of St. Mary's county, were read the first time and laid on the table.

The resolution to compensate the commissioners for examining the turnpike road, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The resolution in favor of Dr. Colin M'Kenzie, was read a third time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill authorising the court of Harford county, to adjudge to be laid out and opened certain roads, was read a second time, and referred to Messrs M'Kim, Chambers, Miller, Brownley and Cockey.

The bill relating to the University of Maryland, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of Bazil L. Stocker and Ann his wife, William Humes, Levi Stocker and Sarah his wife, and Nancy Humes, was read a second time and referred to Messrs Chambers, M'Kim and Miller.

The bill to prevent swine and geese from going at large in the village of Friendship in Anne Arundel county, and the bill for the benefit of Capt. James Mitchell of Cecil county, were read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill annulling the marriage of Mary Parker of Queen Ann's county, and state of Maryland, and Isaac Parker, of Washington county, and state aforesaid, was read a second time and referred to Messrs Chambers, Quinton, Dickinson, Cockey and Wootton.

The bill to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of John Rigby, as a justice of the peace for Queen-Ann's county, was read a second and by special order a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to enable the commissioners of the town of Havre-de Grace, to hold a lot of ground and the improvements therein mentioned, and the bill relating to the opening of Bottle Alley in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, were read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill annulling the marriage of Adelaide V. Lowe and Bradley S. A. Lowe, of Frederick county, and the bill for the relief of Mary Debruler of Frederick county, were severally read a second time and referred to Messrs Chambers, Quinton, Dickinson, Cockey and Wootton.

Mr Johnson presented the petition of Peter Everly and others of Frederick county, praying a law to vest them with the title to certain property; which was read and referred to Messrs Chambers, M'Kim and Miller.
