

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

The bill for the benefit of Samuel Thomas, of Talbot county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to authorize the congregation of the German Reformed Church in Middletown, in Frederick county, to raise a sum of money by lottery to defray the expense in part for building their church in said town, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Quinton and Dickinson.

The bill to enlarge the powers of the trustees of the poor of Saint Mary's county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The further supplement to an act for making certain roads in Baltimore and Harford counties, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Dedman, of Kent county, and a bill for opening roads in Harford county; which were read the first time and laid on the table; and returns the bill to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned, in Cecil county, and the supplement to the act to establish a bank in the city of Baltimore, to be called the City Bank of Baltimore, endorsed 'will pass.'

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 26, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution rescinding a resolution of eighteen hundred and seventeen, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill relative to the town of Elkton, in Cecil county, was read a third time, and referred to Messrs. Chambers, Miller and M. Kim.

The bill declaring the assent of the legislature to a conveyance of lands in Harford county, made in trust for the benefit of the preachers of the Methodist Episcopal Church that may have families on the Harford circuit, was read a third time and will pass with the proposed amendment. Amendment proposed—Strike out from the word 'or' in the fourth line, second section, and insert 'for the uses and purposes aforesaid.' Sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Wootton asked and obtained leave of absence for Mr. Kent until Wednesday next.

The bill to repeal part of the act of assembly therein mentioned and for other purposes; the bill to authorize Walker K. Armistead to remove a certain negro into the state of Maryland, were read a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act to incorporate the stockholders of the Marine bank of Baltimore, was read a second, and by special order a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill for the relief of Eleanor Hicks, of Charles county; the bill for the support and maintenance of Teresa Mankin, of Charles county, and her infant children; the bill authorizing the levy court of Frederick county to raise a sum of money to build a bridge over Big Pipe creek, were severally read a second time and laid on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act to lay out a public road from Cecilton to Elkton, in Cecil county. Ordered, that Messrs. Chambers, Miller and Brownley bring in the same.

The further additional supplement to the act to regulate elections, was read a third time and referred to Messrs. Chambers, M. Kim and Quinton.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill to lay out and open a road in Baltimore county; a bill for the relief of Elijah Morress, Lydia Anthony and Margaret Wherret, of Caroline county; a bill entitled, An additional supplement to the act entitled, An act authorizing the appointing inspectors and wood corders, and to regulate the cording of fire wood brought by water to the city of Baltimore for sale; a bill to authorize the president and managers of the Roonsborough turnpike road company to raise by lottery a sum of money, and for other purposes; a supplement to an act to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of the commissioners of the town of Princess Anne, in Somerset county; and a bill authorizing a lottery to build a Presbyterian church in Elkton, Cecil county; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table; and returns the bill entitled, A supplement to the act to incorporate the stockholders of the Marine Bank of Baltimore, endorsed 'will pass.'

Mr. Chambers from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, A further additional supplement to the act to regulate elections, reported the same with sundry amendments; which amendments with the bill were read a third time, and the question was put, Shall the bill as amended pass? Determined in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the house of delegates.

The supplement to the act for the improvement of the public roads in Kent county, was read a third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments. Amendments proposed—1st. In the seventh line, after the word 'dollar' insert 'and fifty cents' 2d. In the same line, after the word 'dollar,' insert 'and fifty cents.' Sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, A supplement to the act to prevent the destruction of oysters in this state; and a bill authorizing Margaret Lewis to remove into this state certain negroes therein mentioned; which were read the first time and laid on the table. Also a bill relating to public roads in the several counties therein mentioned; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Johnson from the committee to whom was referred the petition and memorial of the representatives of the society of Friends or people called Quakers, in the city of Baltimore, submitted the following report:
