

The committee beg leave to report, that the parties have appeared before the committee, and have explained the grounds of their respective pretensions. The committee feel sincere pleasure in having it in their power to say that an arrangement entirely satisfactory to all the parties, and calculated to effect all the prominent objects and wishes has been concurred in by the petitioners and memorialists, whereby a painful and laborious investigation into the details of their respective claims will be avoided both to the committee and to the senate. The committee have prepared a bill framed in pursuance of the arrangement thus amicably effected, which bill they herewith submit; which was read; and a bill entitled, *An act vesting certain property in the eastern part of the city of Baltimore in trustees, for the use and benefit of the society of Friends or people called Quakers, in the said city; which was read the first time and laid on the table.*

On motion the resolution rescinding a resolution of 1817, was referred to Messrs. Johnson, Chambers, Quinton, Cockey and Brownley.

The bill to authorize a lottery or lotteries to raise a sum of money for the purpose of opening and cutting a canal from the head of Black Water river, into the head of Parson's creek, in Dorchester county, and for paying the expenses of a lottery for said canal, repealed in eighteen hundred and sixteen, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Quinton and Dickinson.

The bill vesting certain property in the eastern part of the city of Baltimore in trustees for the use and benefit of the society of Friends or people called Quakers, in the said city, was read a second time by special order, amended, and the question was put, Shall the bill with the amendment be engrossed for a third reading? Determined in the affirmative.

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

#### MONDAY, January 28, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday except Mr Kent. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The bill for the relief of Eleanor Hicks of Charles county; the bill for the support and maintenance of Teresa Mankin of Charles county and her infant children; the bill to enlarge the powers of the trustees of the poor of Saint Mary's county, were read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill for the benefit of the stock-holders of the Susquehannah bridge, was on motion referred to Messrs. Johnson, Quinton and Dickinson.

The bill for the benefit of Samuel Thomas of Talbot county, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Dedman and others of Kent county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for opening roads in Harford county; the bill authorising Margaret Lewis to remove certain negroes into the state of Maryland, were read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the relief of Elijah Morris, Lydia Anthony and Margaret Wherret of Caroline county, was read a second time, amended, and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to lay out and open a road in Baltimore county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill authorising a lottery to build a Presbyterian church in Elkton, Cecil county, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Quinton and Dickinson.

The supplement to the act to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of the commissioners of the town of Princess-Anne in Somerset county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to authorise the president and managers of the Boonsborough Turnpike road company to raise by lottery a sum of money and for other purposes, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Quinton and Dickinson.

The additional supplement to the act authorising the appointing inspectors and wood-corders, and to regulate the cording of fire wood, brought by water to the city of Baltimore for sale, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. M<sup>r</sup>Kim, Quinton and Brownley.

The supplement to the act to prevent the destruction of oysters in this state, was read a second time, amended and laid on the table.

The bill relating to public roads in the several counties therein mentioned, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. M<sup>r</sup>Kim, Miller and Brownley.

The bill authorising the levy court of Frederick county to raise a sum of money to build a bridge over Big Pipe creek, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill vesting certain property in the eastern part of the city of Baltimore in trustees for the use and benefit of the society of friends or people called Quakers, in the said city, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Bowie appeared in the senate.

Mr. Bowie from the committee to whom was referred the bill for the benefit of Robert Guest, of Charles county, reported the same without amendments, and the bill was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill relating to the University of Maryland, was read a third time, and will not pass, and was sent to the house of delegates.

The additional supplement to the act regulating the inspection of lumber in the city and county of Baltimore, was read a third time and will pass.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to be entitled, A supplement to an act entitled, An act to authorise a lottery or lotteries to raise a sum of money for the purpose of repairing and raising a
