

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

Mr. M'Kim from the committee reported a bill entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to voters and qualification of voters so far as they concern the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Johnson from the committee reported a bill entitled, An act relating to crimes and punishments in the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The supplement to an act for the preservation of the navigation of a branch of Nanticoke river, called North West Fork, in Caroline county, and the bill to authorize the abutment of a bridge on the Maryland shore of the Potomac river at Harper's ferry, and for other purposes, were severally read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to authorize the recording of a deed from Jacob Charles, of Caroline county, to Thomas Payne, of said county, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. Chambers, M'Kim and Miller.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Feb. 1, 1822.

Gentlemen of the Senate—We have rejected the following words in the third amendment proposed by you to the bill entitled, A supplement to the act incorporating into one the several acts relating to constables' fees, to wit: "And that each constable shall receive for serving execution on body and return thereof, the sum of thirty-three and a third cents." All the other amendments and the foregoing part of the third amendment has been assented to by us.

We herewith return the bill to your honorable body, and hope upon reconsideration that you will pass the same without that part which has been rejected by us.

Also the bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act incorporating into one the several acts relating to constables' fees. Also a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act for founding a college on the Western Shore of this state, and constituting the same, together with Washington College on the Eastern Shore into one University, by the name of the University of Maryland; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill for the benefit of Robert Usselton and Benjamin Arno, of Kent county; the bill empowering the levy court of Cecil county, at their discretion, to levy a sum of money to build a bridge over Octorara creek, in said county, at or near Samuel Rowland's store, were read a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

On motion, the senate reconsidered the amendments proposed to the bill incorporating into one the several acts relating to constables' fees, and the question was put, will the senate agree to strike out the following words contained in their third amendment to the said bill? "And that each constable shall receive for serving execution on body, and return thereof, the sum of thirty-three and a third cents." Determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a bill for the benefit of Thomas J. Perry, late of Allegany county, which was read the first and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs. Wootton, Miller, Brown, Chambers and Bowie. Also a bill for the benefit of William Osborne, of Allegany county; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs. Wootton, Miller, Brown, Chambers and Bowie. Also a bill for the benefit of William Harness, of Allegany county; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs. Bowie, Quinton and Cockey.

Mr. Bowie from the committee to whom was referred the bill for the benefit of William Harness, of Allegany county, reported the same without amendment, and the bill having been read a third time, the question was put, Shall the bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The senate resumed the consideration of the resolution in favor of Luther Martin, esq. and after some debate the further consideration of the same was postponed until to-morrow.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, An act to continue in force the acts of assembly which would expire with the present session; and a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of Marcellus Keene, of the city of Baltimore.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday except Mr. Dickinson, Mr. Kent, appeared in the senate. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Johnson moved for and obtained leave of absence for Mr. Bowie.

The senate resumed the consideration of the resolution in favor of Luther Martin, Esq. and after considerable debate the question was put, will the senate assent to the resolution? Determined in the negative.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Richard W. West; a bill for the benefit of Marcellus Keene of the City of Baltimore; which were read the first time and laid on the table.

The further supplement to an act to incorporate the Stockholders of the Union Bank of Maryland, and the bill to continue in force the acts of Assembly, which would expire with the present session, were read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill empowering the levy court of Harford county, in their discretion, to build two bridges over Deer creek in Harford county, was read a third time and will pass.

The supplement to the act for the distribution of a certain fund for the establishment of free schools in the several counties therein named, and the supplement to the act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the public square in Hager's town, to intersect the trupike road
