TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution in favor of Samuel Lecompte; the bill for the benefit of Washington lodge, No. 3, in the city of Baltimore; the bill to incorporate the President and Managers of the Shot Tower company of Baltimore, were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

Mr. Chambers from the committee reported a bill to lay out a public road from Cecilton to Elkton in Cecil county; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

On motion of Mr Brownley, Leave was given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to alter and change the place of holding elections at Hall's cross roads in the second election district in Harford county, and it was ordered that Messrs Brownley, Miller and Cockey be a committee to bring in the same. Mr Brownley from the committee reported the said bill, and it was read the first and by special order a second and third time and will pass.
