

special order a second time, and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Dickinson, Chambers, Miller and Price.

The further and additional supplement to the act concerning crimes and punishments; and the bill relating to the payment of pensions granted by this state, were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

The bill to provide a revenue for the support of the government of this state, was read the first, and by special order the second time, and referred to the committee on finance.

The bill relating to the acknowledgments and effect of deeds made by corporate bodies, was read a third time, amended, and will pass.

The resolution in favor of Benjamin Duvall, of Elisha, and the resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas, were read a second time by special order, and referred to the committee on revolutionary pensions.

The bill relating to the public roads in Prince George's county, was read a third time and will not pass.

The resolution in favor of Henry M. Murray, was read a third time by special order, and assented to.

The bill taxing or licensing certain dealers in lottery tickets and others, was referred to Messrs. Bowie, Chambers, Orrell, Wootton and M'Kim.

Mr. Chambers from the committee to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Benjamin Duvall, of Elisha, reported the same without amendment, and the same being read a third time, the question was put, will the senate assent to the resolution? Determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Chambers from the committee to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and was of opinion that the said resolution ought not to pass. The resolution was then read a third time and dissented from.

Mr. Chambers from the said committee submitted the following message, which was read and adopted.

BY THE SENATE, February 18, 1822.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates*—The senate have rejected the resolution received from your house, in favor of Joseph Thomas. The senate have been induced so to do by a belief, that if the amount be paid to the said Thomas, it will not be applied to any useful purpose.

The senate will unite in passing a resolution directing the amount mentioned in your resolution to be paid to a trustee, to be applied to the use of the said Thomas, as the trustee may think best calculated to promote his comfort.

The bill for the benefit of William Osborn, of Allegany county, was read a third time and will not pass.

Mr. M'Kim submitted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, By a resolution passed December session, 1818, the term of payment of the loan of thirty thousand dollars, due this state from the Potomac Company on the first day of January 1819, was extended to the first day of December 1821, on condition that the president and directors of said company pay to the treasurer of the Western Shore, on or before the first day of July 1819, the interest due on said loan. And whereas it appears that the president and directors of the Potomac Company have entirely neglected to comply with said resolution; Therefore, *Resolved*, that the governor and council be, and they are hereby authorized and requested to take such means as they may deem proper and necessary for the recovery and punctual payment of the interest due and arising on the said loan of thirty thousand dollars, due by the president and directors of the Potomac Company. Which was read.

The senate reconsidered the bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, An act for the benefit of the trustees of Garrison Forrest Academy, and the Franklin Academy, in Baltimore county, and the question was put, Shall the bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

TUESDAY, February 19, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The supplement to the act for the benefit of the trustees of Garrison Forrest Academy, and the Franklin Academy in Baltimore county; the bill for the benefit of William Osborn of Allegany county; the bill relating to the public roads in Prince George's county; the bill relating to the acknowledgments and effects of deeds made by corporate bodies; the bill relating to justices of the peace in the city of Baltimore, with the message relative thereto; the bill for the benefit of William K. Austin, of Talbot county; the further supplement to the act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-de-Grace; the resolution rescinding a resolution of 1817; the resolution in favor of Henry M. Murray; the resolution in favor of Benjamin Duvall (of Elisha) and the resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas, with the message relating thereto, were sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Brownley from the committee to whom was referred the bill for the relief of Ann Merryman, reported the same without amendment, and the question was put, Shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:
