

NEGATIVE.—Messrs Bowie, Cockey, Johnson, Kent, Price and Wootton.—6. So it was determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Johnson then moved to amend the amendment to the substitute by adding the following: 'And if it shall not appear to the satisfaction of the executive that all the profits of the company have been applied to the improvement of the river and the raising the value of the stock they are hereby requested.' And the question was put. The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

NEGATIVE.—Messrs Stuart (President,) Brownley, Claude, Dickinson, McKim, Miller and Orrell.—7. So it was determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr Bowie the question was then put on that part of the resolution ending at the word 'paid,' and determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, on the remaining part of the resolution and determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, will the senate receive the same as a substitute for the original resolution proposed by Mr McKim? Determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, An additional supplement to the act for the better regulation of the Militia of the city of Baltimore, a bill entitled, An act for the relief of George Womerdorf of Washington county; a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Joseph E. Bently and Joseph Delaplane of Montgomery county; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table; also a resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas; a resolution in favor of Michael Hansey; a resolution in favor of Edward Shoebrook; a resolution in favor of Ann Spedden; a resolution in favor of Gilbert Middleton; a resolution in favor of Benjamin Uncles; a resolution in favor of Benjamin Tickle; a resolution in favor of Henry Carberry; a resolution in favor of Sarah Wynne; a resolution in favor of Ann Jackson; a resolution in favor of Clement Sewell; a resolution in favor of Robert Wilmot; a resolution in favor of Mark Goldsborough; a resolution in favor of Elizabeth Issabel; a resolution in favor of Adam Ott; a resolution in favor of Edward Hood; a resolution in favor of John Williams; a resolution in favor of Isaac Hoband; which were severally read the first and by special order a second time and referred to the committee on Revolutionary claims.

Mr Johnson from the committee reported a bill entitled, An act concerning the Chancery court; which was read the first and by special order a second and third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr McKim from the committee to whom was referred the bill for altering and amending the road leading from Baltimore City to Belle Air in Harford county, reported the same without amendment, and the bill was then read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The senate resumed the consideration of the amendments proposed by the house of delegates, to the bill entitled, A further additional supplement to the act to establish and incorporate a Medical and Chirurgical faculty in the state of Maryland; which were read and assented to and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill for building a bridge over Tuckahoe creek where the old Bridge now stands, was read a third time, amended and will pass.

Mr Miller from the committee to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas, reported the same and it was read a third time and assented to.

The senate adjourned until half past 6 o'clock.

POST MERIDIEM, HALF PAST 6 O'CLOCK,

The senate met. Present the same members as in the morning.

Mr Johnson from the Committee to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Elizabeth Issabel reported that the committee had had the same under consideration and were of opinion that it ought to pass; the resolution was then read a third time and assented to.

Mr Johnson from the same committee to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Mark Goldsborough reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration and were of opinion that it ought not to pass. The question was then put, will the senate concur in the report of the committee? Determined in the negative. On motion of Mr Claude the further consideration of the same was postponed until to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Bowie the senate resolved itself into a committee of the whole Mr McKim in the chair, on the further supplement to the act entitled, An act to regulate lotteries, and after some time the committee rose and reported the bill with the following amendments. 1st. In the 3rd line 1st section, strike out 'three' and insert 'five.' 2d. In the same line strike out the words 'or one for each commissioner.' 3d. In the 4th line same section, strike out 'fifty' and insert 'forty.' 4th. In the 5th line same section after the word 'dollars' insert 'for each security;' which amendments were read and assented to; the bill was then read a third time, and on motion of Mr Bowie the question was put, will the senate receive the following as amendments? In the 5th line 2nd section, strike out from the word 'lotteries' in the 11th line to the word 'lottery.' The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE—Messrs Bowie, Claude and Wootton.—3.

NEGATIVE—Messrs Stuart (President,) Brownley, Dickinson, Johnson, Kent, McKim, Miller, Orrell and Price.—9. So it was determined in the negative.

The question was then put, shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow

AFFIRMATIVE.—Messrs Stuart (President,) Brownley, Dickinson, Johnson, Kent, McKim, Miller and Orrell.—8

NEGATIVE.—Messrs Bowie, Claude and Price.—3. So it was determined in the affirmative.
