Gent'men of the House of Delegates, - The sen ate ask for a conference with your honorable body on all bilis from your house relating to the revenue, except those upon which the senate have Mesers Bowie, Orrell and Price, are appointed a committee on the part of the senate to join sech gentlemen as may be nominated by your house.

The cierk of the house of delegates delivered the bill concerning the school fund in Washington county; the further supplement to the act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road lead. ing to Compertand, and for the extension of the charters of the several hanks in the city of Bal. timore, and for the purposes, and the bil relative to the road made by the United States from Cumberland on the Potomic river, to or near Wheeling on the Onio river, everally endorsed, will pass." Also the further supplement to the act regulating the inspection of tobacce, endorsed, will pass with the proposed amendments to the amendm n's.

On motion of Mr Price, Leave was given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to resinquish the right of the state to certain lands therein mentioned, and it was ordered, That Messre Price,

Claude and Dickinson, he a committee to bring in the same.

The senate adjourned until half past 6 o'clock.

The senate met. Present the same members as in the morning

The senate considered the amendments proposed by the house of de egates to the amendments adopted by the senate to the bili entitled, A further supplement to the act regulating the inspection of t.bacco, and the question was put, Will the senate assent to the amendments? Determined in the affirmative.

The turther supplement to the act to regulate the inspection of tobacco was then read and re-

jected.

Mr Miller from the committee reported a bill entitled, An act to by out and open a road from the bridge erected over the Susquehannah River, at or near Rock Run, to intersect the road eading rom Baltimore city to Havre De Grace; which was read the first and by special order a second time and laid on the table.

The bill for the relief of Joseph E. Bently and Joseph Delaplane, of Monigomery county, was

read the second and by special order a third time and will not pass

The bill to author me the orphans' court of Montgomery county to appoint a trustee to convey the lands of the heirs of John A Brown to Joseph Neale, was read a third time and will pass

The bill to impose and collect a tax on the estates of deceased persons, was read a third time and

will not pass.

Mr. Price from the committee reported a hill entitled. An act resinquishing the right of the state to certain lands therein mentioned; which was read the first and by special order a second and third time and will pass.

Mr. John on from the committee appoin ed to meet the committee on the part of the house of delegates to count the ballots in the election of the directors on the part of the state for the several

banks, made the foil wing report:

The committee retired to the conference room and on counting the ballo's, found that for the Union Bank of Maryland, William Pinkney Jr. had thirty-thr e votes, and William St. nsburv had torty votes. For the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore, Tobias E. Stan-bary had forty-three votes, and William S ewart had forty three votes. Fo the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Battimore, Upton Bruce had forty-two votes, and John Barney had forty three votes. For the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, Nicholas Brewer had forty-six votes and John Johnson had fifty votes. Ramsay Waters had one vote, Win, H Marriott had one vote, and Philemon Chew had one vote. For the Branch Bank at Easton, Lambert Reardon had forty four votes and William Clirk had forty four votes. For the Hagar's Town Bank, John Buchannan had forty-one vo es, and Damel Schnettly had forty-one votes. For the Elkton Bank, George Beaston had thirty seven votes. They also found that two votes were given for William Pinkney Jr and William Stansbury, without designating the bank, and that there were five blanks

Whereupon it was declared in the senate, that William Pinkney Jr. and William Stansbury, for the Union Bank of Maryland; Tobias E. S anshury and William S ewart for the Mechanics' Bank; John Baney and Upton B uce for the Commercial and Faceers' Bank; Nicholas Brewer and John Johnson for the Farmers' Bank o' Maryland; William Clarke and Lemmert Reard n, for the Branch of the Farmer Bank of Maryland, at Eas or; John Buchannan and D-mel Schnebly, for the Hager's Town Bank, and George Beaston, for the Elkton Bank, are duly elected directors on the part

of the state, for and during the time prescribed by law.

Mr Johnson from the committee on revolutionary claims, made the following report: The committee to whom was referred the several resolutions in favor of revolutionary soldies and the widows of revolutionary soldiers, beg le ve to report; - That they had the same under consideration and have determined on suggesting to the senare the propriety or adopting some general The committee have viewed with concern the rules in relation to all claims of this description increasing demand on the treasury which is made at every session of the legislature by revolutionary cl im nts.
